LITURGY CORNER: What is Passiontide?

The last two weeks of Lent are known as Passiontide: this is the third and final stage of the preparation for Easter that began with Septuagesima and developed with Lent. Passiontide includes two Sundays, known as Passion Sunday and Palm Sunday. The second week of Passiontide is Holy Week, which itself culminates with the Sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. The spirit of penance in the liturgy or of stripping away intensifies during Passiontide: at Septuagesima, violet vestments were introduced and the Gloria in excelsis and Alleluia disappeared from the Mass; with Lent, the organ was silenced and flowers no longer decorate the altar, and the deacon and subdeacon traded in their joyful dalmatics for folded chasubles. Now, in this second part of Lent, the joyful Psalm 42 is omitted from the prayers at the foot of the altar, and the Gloria Patri is no longer said at its normal place in Mass (after the Asperges, at the Introit, at the psalm Lavabo when the priest washes his hands). In these last two weeks of Lent, the Lenten Preface is replaced at Mass by the Preface of the Holy Cross (also used on the feasts of the Holy Cross and the Precious Blood), as the thought of Our Lord's impending sufferings comes to fill our mind. O holy Lord, Father almighty, everlasting God; Who didst establish the salvation of mankind on the tree of the Cross; that whence death came, thence also life might arise again, and that he [the devil], who overcame by the tree, by the tree also might be overcome. At Vespers we sing the beautiful hymn Vexilla Regis in honor of the Cross, the victorious standard of Christianity:

> Vexilla Regis prodeunt; Fulget Crucis mysterium, Qua Vita mortem pertulit, Et morte vitam prótulit. ...

O Crux, ave, spes unica, Hoc Passionis tempore Piis adauge gratiam, Reisque dele crimina. Abroad the regal banners fly, Now shines the cross's mystery; Upon it Life did death endure, And yet by death did life procure. ...

O Cross, our one reliance, hail! This holy Passiontide avail To give fresh merit to the saint, And pardon to the penitent.

The most notable feature of Passiontide, however, is the covering of the images in the church: the crucifixes are all covered and, if it is not possible to cover all the images, at least the ones that adorn the altars or serve as a particular focus of devotion, should be covered. In the Middle Ages, this covering was done in some places at the beginning of Lent, and often a giant curtain, the "Lenten veil," was drawn across the sanctuary during this whole season, to remind us that we have been driven from paradise by Adam's sin, and it will be reopened to us only by Christ's victory over sin and death at Easter (in the liturgy, the nave, the place where the people sit, represents the Church on earth, and the sanctuary represents heaven). The veiling of the images is also a reference to the Gospel of Passion Sunday: "They therefore took up stones to cast at Him; but Jesus hid Himself, and went out from the temple" (John 8:59). The cross is unveiled liturgically on Good Friday, and if any other images had been veiled, they are uncovered during the Gloria at the Easter Vigil, as the bells are rung.

Second Collections Policy

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

As you know, we are the great guardians of Tradition (with a capital "T") and of traditions (with a lower case "t") & customs. When a custom, however, loses its reason for existence or becomes outdated then we must move on. Having a 2nd collection at every single Sunday Mass has become such a matter. Its original purpose of coming to the aid of paying certain bills is outdated by both the health of the parish and by the marked envelopes that you can simply put in the normal collection. Also, when we have a 2nd collection at every Sunday Mass, it defeats the purpose of having exceptional collections when the need arises, such as those marked by the Diocese or the Institute of Christ the King. Lastly, and most importantly, there are other things we should be doing after receiving Holy Communion.

Thus, with the unanimous approval of the Trustees, there will be only exceptional 2nd collections.

In Summary: There is no longer a 2nd collection taken up after Communion unless explicitly announced. *Moving forward, you can simply put 2nd collection envelopes in the regular collection should you still want to use them.*
