Today on Quinquagesima Sunday, three days before Ash Wednesday, the Church seeks to help us to get our proper orientation for the holy season of Lent. The Word of God proclaimed to us is meant to make us aware of our need for God's mercy and to come to get it. It's meant to help us learn how to walk by faith, or, even better as we see in the Gospel, to spring up and run by faith. It's meant

to help us focus on God's love for us in such a way that we will be transformed to love others by the same standard. Let's allow what God is teaching us in these readings to sink deeply within so that, like the blind man in the Gospel, we can cry out to Jesus for the help we need and resolve with that assistance to live the best Lent of our life.

Today Jesus asks us as He asked Bartimaeus, "What do you want me to do for you?" Let us each ask Him, for ourselves, for each other, and for all Catholics, especially those in most need of God's mercy, to help us to live Lent with the trusting faith and passionate, all-consuming love God desires and deserves. Let us ask Him to transform us that we, like Bartimaeus, may come to experience the depth of God's saving love and spend the rest of our life giving glory to God so that all others may praise Him.

What is Lent?

The word Lent translates to the more significant Latin term *quadragesima*, meaning the "forty days", or more literally the "fortieth day".

Lent is a preparation for the liturgical celebration of the great Pascal Mystery wherein catechumens and the faithful recall their own baptisms, and do penance for their sins.

"Lent recalls the forty days of our Lord's fasting in the desert, which He undertook before entering into His public ministry. We read in the Gospel: "Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was hungry" (Mt 4,1-2). Like Moses, who fasted before receiving the tablets of the Law (cf. Ex 34,28) and Elijah's fast before meeting the Lord on Mount Horeb (cf. 1 Kings 19,8), Jesus, too, through prayer and fasting, prepared Himself for the mission that lay before Him, marked at the start by a serious battle with the tempter."

"The observance of Lent is the very badge of Christian warfare. By it we prove ourselves not to be enemies of Christ. By it we avert the scourges of divine justice. By it we gain strength against the princes of darkness, for it shields us with heavenly help. Should men grow remiss in their observance of Lent, it would be a detriment to God's glory, a disgrace to the Catholic religion, and a danger to Christian souls. Neither can it be doubted that such negligence would become the source of misery to the world, of public calamity, and of private woe." - Pope Benedict XIV

Blessing and Distribution of Ashes precedes each Mass

In biblical times it was common to sprinkle ashes on the head as a sign of repentance and humility.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, which is the time we contemplate our relationship with God and identify the areas in our spiritual life that need work. The ashes are a physical reminder of our Lenten journey; by receiving the ashes on our heads and keeping them on through the day, we are recognizing that life passes away on earth.



Therefore we strive during Lent to turn away from sin, refocus our lives on following God's commandments, and look towards the Kingdom of Heaven.

Lenten Regulations

1. Ash Wednesday (March 2) & Good Friday (April 15) are days of abstinence from meat and also days of fast, that is, only one full meal is allowed; with no solid food between meals. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs but they together should not equal another full meal.
2. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.
3. The obligation to abstain from meat commences at fourteen years of age.
4. The obligation to fast commences at eighteen years of age and ends at fifty-nine years of age.
5. Although the faithful enjoy freedom in conscience to excuse themselves for a just cause from these mitigated laws of fast and abstinence, the obligation to do penance is a serious one and **no Catholic should lightly excuse himself/herself from this obligation in Lenten Season.** Practices of Lenten penances and acts of mortification, increased devotion and prayer, and acts of mercy and charity, are worthy elements of our sincere preparation for Easter.
