IMPORTANCE OF CATHOLIC FAMILIES

The Confraternity of the Holy Rosary will be taking orders 100% beeswax candles for home use. These candles will be solemnly blessed at on the feast of the Purification (Candlemas—Feb. 2nd) and distributed the following Sunday. Please see the order form in the vestibule in the coming weeks for information.

It is customary to bring candles from home to be blessed -- at least 51% beeswax candles that one uses for devotional purposes (candles for the family altar, Advent candles, etc.) -- so they can be lit after dusk on All Saints' Day, during the administration of Extreme Unction, and during storms or times of trouble.

ntroit. *Prov. 23-25.* Let the father of the Just rejoice greatly; let thy father and thy mother be joyful, and let her rejoice that bore thee. *Ps. 82,2-3.* How lovely are Thy tabernacles O Lord of hosts; my soul longeth and fainteth for the courts of the Lord.

Prayer. O Lord Jesus Christ, Who, in the days of Thy subjection to Mary and Joseph, didst consecrate home life by inefable acts of virtue; by the intercession of Thy holy Mother and of Thy foster-Father, make us so to profit by the example they with Thee have set us, that we may be counted members of Thy household for evermore. Who livest.

E pistle. *Col.3,12-17.* Brethren, put ye on, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, the bowels of mercy, benignity, humility, modesty, patience; bearing with one another, and forgiving one another, if any have a complaint against another, even as the Lord hath forgiven you, so you also. But above all these things, have charity, which is the bond of perfection: and let the peace of Christ rejoice in your hearts, wherein also you are called in one body: and be ye thankful. And when Jesus was twelve years old, they going up into Jerusalem according to the custom of the feast, and having fulfilled the days, when they returned, the child Jesus remained in Jerusalem; and His parents knew it not. And thinking that He was in the company, they came a day's journey, and sought Him among their kinsfolks and acquaintances. And not finding Him, they returned into Jerusalem, seeking Him. And it came to pass, that after three days they found Him in the temple sitting in the midst of the doctors, hearing them and asking them questions. And all that heard Him were astonished at His wisdom and His answers. And seeing Him they wondered. And His mother said to Him, Son, why hast Thou done so to us? behold Thy father and I have sought Thee sorrowing. And He said to them, How is it that you sought Me? did you not know that I must be about My Father's business? And they understood not the word that He spoke unto them. And all that heard Him were astonished at His wisdom and His answers.

By remaining unknown to His parents in Jerusalem in spite of the suffering that they would feel and which He felt Himself, He wished to teach men to put the interests of God's glory above natural affections, even the most lawful ones.

To change filial affection into a spiritual love is not to destroy but to perfect it; in a certain sense, to make it divine.

Mary and Joseph loved Jesus with their whole hearts; He was all in all to them, He was the life of their life. When they lost His sweet Presence, the world became a melancholy desert to them. How great, then, must have been their sorrow and their agony!

Why is it that when you have lost Jesus by sin you are so little touched and afflicted? Is it not because you love His so feebly; because He is far from being all to you? Further, in the language of the saints, to lose Jesus is not only to be separated from Him by mortal sin, and to be less united to Him by affection to venial sin, but also to be deprived of the sweetness and consolation of His sensible Presence.
