OUR EASTER DUTIES

 \sim THE THIRD PRECEPT OF HOLY MOTHER CHURCH \sim

The Easter duty is the obligation to receive Holy Communion. It is required by *Canon 920*:

"§1. After heing initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, each of the faithful is obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year.

§2. This precept must be fulfilled during the Easter season unless it is fulfilled for a just cause at another time during the year."

Though the obligated to go to confession once a year is a separate precept of the Church, it is related in the sense that, in order to receive Holy Communion, one might need to go to confession first in order to be in a state of grace, since a sacrilegious Communion simply does not fulfill our Easter Duty.

The Easter Duty is a minimum requirement in order to motivate the faithful to receive the sacraments. Ideally however, a Catholic ought to receives Holy Communion at least weekly.

* The dioceses of the U.S. have an indult which allows the fulfillment of the Easter duty from the first Sunday of Lent through Trinity Sunday.

Perhaps You Have Wondered?

Have you ever wondered why there is a cloth which lines the altar rail? The altar rail, sometimes referred to as the communion table, or communion rail, is a continuation of the altar. It is where the faithful are nourished by our Blessed Lord in the Eucharist. This rail, to symbolize the continuity of the altar, has a cloth which serves a very important purpose, as do the three altar cloths which lay upon the altar itself.

The three altar cloths have mystical and practical meanings: the cloths remind us of the linen cloths in which the body of Christ was wrapped while resting in the tomb and symbolize the mystical members of Christ, that is, the faithful of God, by whom the Lord (symbolized by the altar) is surrounded as with precious garments, according to the word of the Psalmist: "The Lord has reigned, He is clothed with beauty..." In addition, the pure linen absorbs quickly the Precious Blood, should a dreaded mishap of spillage ever occur.


The cloth which covers the altar rail also serves to catch the Blessed Sacrament if ever a Host were to fall and miss the communion paten held by the server. The faithful holds this cloth at chest level with both hands and makes a small pocket or cup with their hands beneath.

LOW SUNDAY



Introit. 1 Pet. 2, 2. As newborn babes, alleluia, desire the rational milk without guile, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. Ps. 80, 2. Rejoice to God our helper: sing aloud to the God of Jacob. V. Glory.

Prayer. Grant, we beseech Thee, O almighty God, that we, who have completed the observance of the paschal festival, may keep it, by Thy bounty, in our life and behavior. Through.

E pistle. 1 John 5, 4-10. Dearly beloved, Whatsoever is born of God, overcometh the world; and this is the victory which overcometh the world, our faith. Who is he that overcometh the world, but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God? This is He that came by water and blood, Jesus Christ; not by water only, but by water and blood. And it is the spirit which testifieth that Christ is the truth. And there are three who give testimony in heaven; the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost: and these three are one. And there are three that give testimony on earth; the spirit, the water, and the blood: and these three are one. If we receive the testimony of men, the testimony of God is greater: for this is the testimony of God which is greater, because He hath testified of His Son. He that believeth in the Son of God hath the testimony of God in himself.

A lleluia, alleluia, V. Matt. 28, 7. In the day of My resurrection, saith the Lord, I will go before you into Galilee. Alleluia. V. John 20, 26. Eight days after, the doors being shut, Jesus stood in the midst of His disciples and said, Peace be unto you. Alleluia.

Gospel. John 20, 19-31. At that time, when it was late that same day, the first of the week, and the doors were shut, where the disciples were gathered together, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came, and stood in the midst, and said to them, Peace be to you. And when He had said this, He showed them His hands and His side. The disciples therefore were glad, when they saw the Lord. He said therefore to them again, Peace be to you: as the Father hath sent Me, I also send you. When He had said this, He

breathed on them; and He said to them, Receive ye the Holy Ghost; whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them, and whose sins you shall retain, they are retained. Now Thomas, one of the twelve, who is called Didymus, was not with them, when Jesus came. The other disciples therefore said to him, We have seen the Lord. But he said to them, Except I see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the place of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe. And after eight days, again His disciples were within, and Thomas with them. Jesus cometh, the doors being shut, and stood in the midst, and said, Peace be to you. Then He said to Thomas, Put in thy finger hither, and see My hands, and bring hither thy hand, and put it into My side; and be not faithless, but believing. Thomas answered, and said to Him, My Lord, and my God. Jesus saith to him, Because thou hast seen Me, Thomas, thou hast believed: blessed are they that have not seen, and have believed. Many other signs also did Jesus in the sight of His disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written, that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ the Son of God; and that, believing, you may have life in His name.

Communion. John 20, 27. Put in thy hand, and know the place of the nails, alleluia; and be not incredulous, but believing, alleluia, alleluia.

LOW SUNDAY ...?

Low Sunday, so-called in English, by contrast with Easter or High Sunday, is known in the Liturgy as *Dominica in Albis*, the Sunday of the laying aside of the white robes; for in early ages it was on the evening before this Sunday that the neophytes, or converts, baptized together on Holy Saturday and then solemnly robed in white, the color symbolical of the innocence recovered by them through the grace of the sacrament, returned to the use of the ordinary habiliments of civil life.

From the time of St. Gregory the Great, the Basilica of the Martyrs outside the walls were never chosen as the object of the stational processions on account of their distance. On the Octave of Easter however, when everything is eloquent of spiritual youth, an exception is made in honor of the tomb of a young martyr, the fourteen-year-old Pancras or Pancratius.

According to the ancient Roman tradition, Easter Week ended with the Vespers of the Saturday after Easter; hence today the neophytes lay aside their white garments as a sign that the festival is over, and resume their ordinary dress.

The Church in the Collect at the Mass snow peaks of Easter as of a festival which has already taken place. The Gospel of todays Mass recalls the institution of the Sacrament of Penance. It was fitting that the Lord should on the very day of the Resurrection institute that sacrament which takes away sorrow and mourning in this world, calling sinners to a new life of sanctity. In memory of that fact, Catholic tradition still imposes on the faithful the duty of receiving absolution from a priest before receiving their Easter Communion.

When the veneration of the martyrs Saints Cosmas and Damian became general in Rome, the Easter stations had been for a long time already settled; however, under Felix IV a station was assigned to the Basilica of Saints Cosmas and Damian, on the second Sunday after Easter. Since this conflicted with the station at St. Peter, it was pushed back until the afternoon of Low Sunday.
