THIRD SUNDAY AFTER EASTER



Introit. Ps. 65, 1, 2. Shout with joy to God, all the earth, alleluia; sing ye a psalm to His name, alleluia: give glory to His praise. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. Ps. 65, 3. Say unto God, how terrible are Thy works, O Lord! in the multitude of Thy strength Thy enemies shall lie to Thee. V. Glory.

Pray. O God, Who dost show the light of Thy truth to them that go astray, that they may be able to return to the path of justice, grant unto all who profess themselves and are reckoned Christians, both to reject the things that are opposed to that name and to follow after the things that befit it. Through our Lord.

Epistle. 1 Pet. 2, 11-19. Dearly beloved, I beseech you as strangers and pilgrims, to refrain yourselves from carnal desires which war against the soul, having your conversation good among the gentiles: that whereas they speak against you as evil-doers, they may by the good works, which they shall behold in you, glorify God in the day of visitation. Be ye subject therefore to every human creature for God's sake: whether it be to the king as excelling: or to governors as sent by him for the punishment of evil-doers, and for the praise of the good: for so is the will of God, that by doing well you may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men. As free, and not as making liberty a cloak for malice, but as the servants of God. Honor all men. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the king. Servants, be subject to your masters with all fear, not only to the good and gentle, but also to the forward. For this is thankworthy in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Alleluia, alleluia. V. Ps. 110:9 The Lord hath sent redemption to His people. Alleluia, V. Luke 24:46. It behooved Christ to suffer these things, and so to enter into His glory. Alleluia.

Gospel. John 16, 16-22. At that time, Jesus said to His disciples, A little while, and now you shall not see Me; and again a little while, and you shall see Me; because I go to the Father. Then some of His disciples said one to another, What is this that He saith to us, A little while, and you shall not see Me; and again a little while, and you shall see Me; and because I go to the Father? They said therefore, What is this that He saith, A little while? we know not what He speaketh. And Jesus knew that they had a mind to ask Him: and He said to them, Of this do you inquire among yourselves because I said, A little while, and you shall not see Me; and again a little while, and you shall see Me?

Amen, amen, I say to you, that you shall lament and weep, but the world shall rejoice; and you shall be made sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turned into joy. A woman when she is in labor hath sorrow, because her hour is come; but when she hath brought forth the child, she remembereth no more the anguish, for joy that a man is born into the world. So also you now indeed have sorrow, but I will see you again, and your heart shall rejoice, and your joy no man shall take from you.

Offertory. Ps. 145, 2. Praise the Lord, O my soul, in my life I will praise the Lord: I will sing to my God as long as I shall be. Alleluia.

Secret. By these mysteries, O Lord, may grace be given us so that, chastening our earthly desires, we may learn to love heavenly things. Through our Lord.

Communion. John 16, 16. A little while, and now you shall not see Me, alleluia: and again a little while, and you shall see Me: because I go to the Father. Alleluia, alleluia.

Postcommunion. May the sacrament we have received, O Lord, we beseech Thee, both restore us with its spiritual nourishment and protect us with its help for our bodies.

SUNDAY MASS ETIQUETTE

The entire Christian law may be summed up in one word—charity. Many rules have been formulated to guide man in his devotion to his neighbor. Catholic etiquette prescribes in particular, how charity should be practiced in church and home, to priest and people. We will content ourselves here with merely stating the decalogue of Catholic etiquette for Sunday observance. You will avoid annoyance to others by remembering it.

1. Make a serious effort to come to church in time for divine services.
2. Do not disturb the faithful by unnecessary talking in the vestibule.
3. Enter the church modestly, genuflect reverently and take the last place in the pew.
4. Remember that, like the publican, you have come to the temple only to pray
5. Use your prayer-book or rosary-beads unostentatiously.
6. Kneel, sit, stand or genuflect at the proper times to avoid making a scene.
7. Patiently await your turn when going to confession and to Holy Communion.
8. Leave the church with modesty and recollection, but not until the priest has left the altar.
9. Always greet the pastor and sisters without first awaiting their salutation.
10. Instruct your non-Catholic friends on these points before bringing them to Catholic services.
