PRAYERS & INSTRUCTION

THE CATHOLIC PRIESTLY ORDERS

OPEFULLY we will recall from our catechism lessons that 'Holy Orders is a sacrament by which bishops, priests, and other ministers of the Church are ordained and receive the power and the grace to perform their sacred duties.' But how many of us are truly familiar with the degrees of this privileged sacrament?

There are in all seven priestly "Orders" in the Catholic Church. The first four are called Minor Orders, the latter three Major Orders.

The Minor Orders as well as the subdeaconate are sacramentals instituted by the Church. The other Orders pertain to the sacrament itself and are divine institutions. The Catholic hierarchy also consists of clerics of various grades of power and jurisdiction. The word 'cleric' is a Greek derivative literally meaning 'inheritance,' signifying that the cleric is "the inheritance of the Lord, and the Lord is their inheritance."

A man becomes a cleric by means of a sacramental called the "Tonsure" which is an ecclesiastical ceremony always preceding the conferral of Minor Orders. When tonsured, a man is thus accepted into the clerical state (also called an ecclesiastic) of the Church.

The clerical state is essentially of divine institution though in accidentals it is of ecclesiastical origin. The divine origin of this state is evident from the various words of Our Saviour to the Apostles: "As the Father has sent Me, so I send you." "Going therefore, teach all nations, baptizing them," etc. "Whose sins you shall forgive they are forgiven them."

Besides the persons of the seven Orders already mentioned, there are other persons who may also occupy places of honor and jurisdiction in the Catholic hierarchy. Among these specially to be mentioned are Archbishops, Patriarchs, Primates, Cardinals, and the Pope or Holy Father. Clerics, by their very state of life, are bound to a life of holiness.

Those in Major Orders are also bound to celibacy, the recitation of the Breviary (or Canonical Hours), and in Catholic countries to the constant wearing of the cassock and the tonsure.

That known, it would be beneficial to delve a little deeper into why these orders were established, and the duties constituted by each.

- (1) Porter Entrusted with the keys to the church, and consequently the duty of ensuring the wholesomeness and safe keeping of this Temple of God, the porter is to bar all who would profane the sacred edifice by impiety or sacrilege. He is also called to ring the church bells, signifying the spiritual function of barring to the devil and opening to God by word and example the hearts of the faithful, calling them to the church to fulfill their fundamental duty of Religion (due worship and honor to God), primarily by the Mass but also other Church liturgies.
- (2) Lector Called to dispense the word of God to the faithful by reading to them those holy doctrines befitting the Temple of the Lord,



Prayer. Let the ears of Thy mercy, O Lord, be open to the prayers of Thy suppliants, and, that Thou mayest grant their desires to them that seek, make them to ask only for those things that please Thee. Through our Lord.

pistle. 1 Cor. 10, 6-13. Brethren, let us not covet evil _ things, as they also coveted. Neither become ye idolaters, as some of them: as it is written: The people sat down to eat and drink, and rose up to play. Neither let us commit fornication, as some of them committed fornication, and there fell in one day three and twenty thousand. Neither let us tempt Christ, as some of them tempted, and perished by the serpents. Neither do you murmur, as some of them murmured, and were destroyed by the destroyer. Gospel. Luke 19, 4-47. At that time, when Jesus drew near to Jerusalem, seeing the city, He wept over it saying, If thou also hadst known, and that in this thy day, the things that are to thy peace: but now they are hidden from thy eyes. For the days shall come upon thee, and thy enemies shall cast a trench about thee, and compass thee round, and straiten thee on every side, and beat thee flat to the ground, and thy children who are in thee; and they shall not leave in thee a stone upon a stone, because thou hast not known the time of thy visitation. And entering into the temple, He began to cast out them that sold therein, and they that bought, saying to them, It is written, My house is the house of prayer, but you have made it a den of thieves. And he was teaching daily in the temple.

ostcommunion. Let the communion of Thy sacrament, we beseech Thee, O Lord, both cleanse us from sin and make us of one mind and one heart in Thy service. Through our Lord.

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the lector chants the lessons of the Church office and is empowered to bless the bread and new fruits of the earth. To this purpose he is obligated to firmly believe and practice that which he reads, teaching the faithful by example the attainment of the virtues to an eminent degree.

- (3) Exorcist Exteriorly, the exorcist is empowered (though typically not enabled) to expel demons from the possessed. He is to notify the faithful of the time to receive Holy Communion, and is charged to pour the water at the lavabo at Mass. He is to banish from body and soul all that is sinful and unbecoming to his calling, lest he himself should become the prey of the very devils he is empowered to rout.
- (4) Acolyte Bidden with the duty of carrying the candles during certain liturgies, he is entrusted to ensuring the can-

dles are lighted, and of presenting the wine and water for Mass (in essence, to serve the sacred ministers at the holiest of all acts, the Sacrifice of the Mass.)

- (5) Subdeacon Sanctioned with the duties of serving the deacon at Mass, in preparing the elements and vessels, solemnly chanting the Epistles, and washing the sacred linens, the subdeacon was at one time also entrusted with the administration of the temporal goods of the Holy See and was often employed on important missions by the popes.
- (6) Deacon To the deacon belongs the duty to assist the priests and to serve in all that is done in the Sacraments, especially in baptism. He also takes custody of the sacred chrisms, but mostly is employed in direct ministry at the altar, preparing the sacred vessels, bringing water for the ablutions, the reading the Gospels. Actual preaching by a deacon, however, despite the precedent of the deacon

Philip, was at all periods rare, and undoubtedly represents the ordinary rule, both in the fourth century and later.

In earlier times, among other things, deacons were stewards of the church funds and of the alms collected for widows and orphans, and guardians of order within the church proper; they saw to it that the faithful occupied their proper places, that none gossiped or slept, etc. Unmistakably, were they conspicuous by their marshaling and directing the congregation during the service. Even to the present day, as will be remembered, such announcements as *Ite missa est, Flectamus genua, Procedamus in pace,* are made by the deacon, though this function was much more pronounced in the early ages.
