LOVE IS COMPLIANT WITH GOD'S INSPIRATIONS

THE SUN'S RAYS give both light and warmth together. Inspirations is a ray of grace bringing light and warmth to our hearts; light to show us what is good; warmth to give us energy to go after it. All living things in this world are numbed by winter's cold; with the return of spring's warmth they come to live again - animals move more swiftly, birds fly higher with livelier song, plants gaily bud and blossom. Without inspiration, the life of the soul is sluggish, impotent, useless. Once the rays of God's inspiration strike it however, we are aware of light and life...our minds are enlightened, our wills inflamed and quickened with strength to intend and fulfill whatever may lead to our salvation

The ways that God has for inspiring us are past all counting... St. Mary of Egypt was inspired by seeing a picture of Our Lady; St. Anthony by hearing the Gospel read at Mass; St. Augustine by listening to the life of St. Anthony; the Duke of Gandia (St. Francis Borgia) by the sight of the empress's corpse; St. Pachomius by noticing an act of charity; the saintly Ignatius of Loyola by reading the lives of the saints.

Blessed are those whose hearts are ever open to God's inspiration; they will never lack what they need to live good, holy lives, or to perform properly the duties of their state.

The first inspiration God ever sends to a man is that of obedience. Was there ever a finer, more unmistakable inspiration than St. Paul's: 'Rise up, and go into the city; there thou shalt be told what thy work is'. He was to obey Ananias, the well-known bishop of Damascus (according to St. Dorotheus). A man who claims to be inspired, but refuses to obey his superiors or to follow their advice is an impostor.

O God, Who dost show the light of Thy truth to them that go astray, that they may be able to return to the path of justice, grant unto all who profess themselves and are reckoned Christians, both to reject the things that are opposed to that name and to follow after the things that befit it. Through our Lord.

Epistle. 1 Pet. 2, 11-19. Dearly beloved, I beseech you as strangers and pilgrims, to refrain yourselves from carnal desires which war against the soul, having your conversation good among the gentiles: that whereas they speak against you as evil-doers, they may by the good works, which they shall behold in you, glorify God in the day of visitation. Be ye subject therefore to every human creature for God's sake: whether it be to the king as excelling: or to governors as sent by him for the punishment of evil-doers, and for the praise of the good: for so is the will of God, that by doing well you may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men. As free, and not as making liberty a cloak for malice, but as the servants of God. Honor all men. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the king. Amen, amen, I say to you, that you shall lament and weep, but the world shall rejoice; and you shall be made sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turned into joy. INFORMATION FOR US ALL

Welcome to St. Anthony of Padua Oratory and the traditional Latin Mass offered by the *Institute of Christ the King Sovereign Priest*. We are pleased to have you join us in this venerable act of worship and invite you to return often.

In the traditional Mass, each person has his proper role, be it celebrant, server, choir, usher, or member of the congregation. At High Mass, the choir makes all sung responses, and at Low Mass it is the function solely of the server, as this was the vision of the Church, aided by the Holy Ghost, for numerous centuries. The congregation respond internally as opposed to vocally, and this is still, according to Pope Pius XII in his encyclical *Mystici Corporis*, active participation. We must always remember that active participation in all its facets begins in the heart, without which our prayers are but empty shells.

While silent meditation or fervent recitation of the Holy Rosary have always been regarded as active participation, it is highly recommended that to assist at the Mass more fully we follow the prayers of the Mass. For this purpose, please use the pew missals provided, paying particular attention to the notes in the margin. All the "propers," or parts of the Mass which are different according to the day, can be found in the bulletin or the handout on the tables in the rear of the church. Simply follow those around you regarding when to stand, sit and kneel, and please keep a *holy silence* in the church at all times out of respect for Christ's presence in the tabernacle. Lastly, because there is no mixing of the old and new, Holy Communion is received on the tongue while kneeling.

A GENTLE REMINDER: ONLY PRACTICING CATHOLICS IN THE STATE OF GRACE (FREE FROM UNCONFESED SERIOUS SIN) ARE FREE TO RECEIVE COMMUNION.
