I resolve never more to offend Thee and I come to offer myself to Thee with the intention of enduring everything rather than to displease Thee. Henceforth, I desire to serve Thee with fidelity and, for the love of Thee, O Divine Infant, I will love my neighbor as myself. All powerful Infant, O Jesus, I implore Thee again, assist me in this need. Grant me the grace of possessing Thee eternally with Mary and Joseph and of adoring Thee with the angels in the heavenly court. Amen.

St. James the Greater

ames, born in Galilee, son of Zebedee and Solome, and a relation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, was a fisherman like his brother John, and one of the first of the apostles called by Christ. He left everything to follow the Lord, and with Peter and John was favored by Christ with special confidence. He was present when Christ was glorified on Mount Thabor, when He healed Peter's mother-in-law of the fever, raised the daughter of Jairus to life, and when He suffered the unutterable terror of death on Mount Olivet.

He and his brother John were called by Christ the *Sons of Thunder*, on account of their great zeal for the honor and kingdom of God. When James, with this thunder like zeal, continued to preach the resurrection and the doctrine of Christ in Judea, the Jews were so enraged that King Herod thought nothing would please them more than that he should condemn the apostle to death; this he did on Easter in the year of our Lord, 44 AD. But when the one who led him to execution saw the firmness of his faith, he also became converted to Christ, and both were therefore led to death. On the way he prayed the apostle to forgive him, who said to him: "Peace be with you!" and kissed him. Both were beheaded.

Thus, James was the first of the apostles to shed his blood for Christ, and to drink of the chalice of suffering. His sacred remains were afterwards brought to Compostela in Spain. The Church celebrates his feast on the day of his translation, and not on the day of his martyrdom, which, as already said, was on Easter.

The Way of St James was one of the most important Christian pilgrimages during the late Middle Ages; other major pilgrimage routes include the Via Francigena to Rome and the pilgrimage to Jerusalem. According to Spanish legends, St. James had spent time preaching the gospel in Spain, but returned to Judea upon seeing a vision of the Virgin Mary on the bank of the Ebro River.

J NTROIT. Ps. 47, 10, 11. We have received Thy mercy, O God, in the midst of Thy Temple; according to Thy name, O God, so also is Thy praise unto the ends of the earth: Thy right hand is full of justice. Ps. 47, 2. Great is the Lord and exceedingly to be praised, in the city of our God, in His holy mountain. V. Glory.

PRAYER. Ever graciously bestow upon us in abundance, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the spirit of thinking and doing what things are right, that we, who cannot exist without Thee, may have the strength to live in conformity with Thee. Through our Lord.

CPISTLE. Rom. 8, 12-17. Brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh; for if you live according to the flesh, you shall die, but if by the spirit you mortify the deeds of the flesh, you shall live. For whosoever are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. For you have not received the spirit of bondage again in fear, but you have received the spirit of adoption of sons, whereby we cry Abba (Father). For the Spirit Himself giveth testimony to our spirit, that we are the sons of God; and if sons, heirs, also; heirs indeed of God, and joint heirs with Christ.

OSPEL. Luke 16, 1-9. At that time, Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: There was a certain rich man who had a steward; and the same was accused unto him that he had wasted his goods; and he called him, and said to him,

How is it that I hear this of thee? Give an account of thy stewardship, for now thou canst be steward no longer. And the steward said within himself, What shall I do, because my lord taketh away from me the stewardship? To dig I am not able: to beg I am ashamed. I know what I will do, that when I shall be put out of the stewardship, they may receive me into their houses. Therefore calling together every one of his lord's debtors, he said to the first, How much dost thou owe my lord? But he said, a hundred barrels of oil. And he said to him, Take thy bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty. Then he said to another, And how much dost thou owe? Who said, a hundred quarters of wheat. He said to him, Take thy bill, and write eighty. And the lord commended the unjust steward, for as much as he had done wisely; for the children of this world are wiser in their generation than the children of light. And I say to you, Make unto you friends of the mammon of iniquity, that when you shall fail, they may receive you into everlasting dwellings.

A SHORT INSTRUCTION ON PILGRIMAGES

With the advent of prearranged pilgrimages from travel agencies, and the softness of modern-day lifestyle, the notion of a traditional pilgrimage has lost much it's dynamism. A visitation of its original intent can serve as a reawakening to its objective.

Pilgrimages were customary in the Old Law... Abraham made a three days' journey in order to perform his sacrifice according to the command of God (*Gen. 22:3*), and the Jews at certain times made pilgrimages to Bethel, which place Jacob had sanctified (*Gen. 28: 18; I Kings 10:3*). In like manner they made, in accordance with a command of Moses, a pilgrimage three times a year, to the ark of the Covenant, and afterwards to the temple at Jerusalem (*Deut. 16: 16*). What were these, but religious pilgrimages?

In the New Testament we read that the parents of Jesus with their Divine Child and with many other persons made yearly pilgrimages to Jerusalem (*Lk. 2:41-42*). That the apostles and pious women visited the sepulcher of Christ (*Mt. 28, Lk. 24*), and that St. Paul, though already a Christian, hastened to Jerusalem to celebrate the feast of Pentecost there (*Acts 20: 16*).

Again in the history of the Church, we find that it was the custom in the earliest ages, as it has continued to be to this day,

to make pilgrimages to holy places, such as to the holy Sepulcher at Jerusalem and to the graves of martyrs.

But how should a pilgrimage be made? In the spirit of true devotion and penance, with the sincere and holy intention of paying homage to God through His saints. Therefore, we should not visit holy places for pleasure and recreation. On the way and when at the place, we should avoid idle talk and sensual excesses, but rather gladly endure all the hardships of the journey; the unfavorable weather, the temporary inconvenience of the lodgings, be moderate in eating and drinking, pray fervently and with recollection. confess all our sins contritely and sincerely, reverently receive the Blessed Sacrament, fervently thank God for all the graces which He has shown to us, make good resolutions, and preserve the good impressions which we have received from the pilgrimage, and manifest them afterwards by a pious life. Whoever makes it thus, is sure to derive real advantage therefrom.
