QUINQUAGESIMA SUNDAY

Introit: *Psalm 30: 3, 4.* Be Thou unto me a God, a protector, and a place of refuge, to save me: for Thou art my strength, and my refuge; and for Thy name's sake Thou wilt be my leader and wilt nourish me. *Ps. 30: 2.* In Thee, O Lord, have I hoped, let me never be confounded: deliver me in Thy justice, and set me free. *V.* Glory be. Be Thou unto me a God.

Collect: Of Thy clemency hearken unto our prayers, O Lord, loose us from the bonds of sin, and keep us from all adversity. Through our Lord.

Epistle: *I Corinthians 13: 1-13.* Brethren, if I speak with the tongues of men, and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. And if I should have prophecy, and know all mysteries, and all knowledge, and if I should have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity; I am nothing. And if I should distribute all my goods to feed the poor, and if I should deliver my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing. Charity is patient, is kind: charity envieth not; dealeth not perversely; is not puffed up; is not ambitious; seeketh not her own; is not provoked to anger; thinketh no evil; rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things. Charity never falleth away: whether prophecies shall be made void, or tongues shall cease or knowledge shall be destroyed. For we know in part, and we prophesy in part. But when that which is perfect is come, that which is in part shall be done away. When I was a child, I spoke as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away the things of a child. We see now through a glass in a dark manner; but then face to face. Now I know in part; but then I shall know even as I am known. And now there remain, faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity.

Gradual: *Psalm 76: 15, 16.* Thou art the God that alone dost wonders: Thou hast made Thy power known among the nations. *V*. With Thy arm Thou hast redeemed Thy people, the children of Israel and of Joseph.

Tract: Psalm 99: 1, 2. Sing joyfully to God all the earth: serve ye the Lord with gladness. V. Come in before His presence with exceeding great joy: know ye that the Lord He is God. V. He made us, and not we ourselves: but we are His people, and the sheep of His pasture.

Gospel: St. Luke 18: 31-43. At that time, Jesus took unto Him the twelve, and said to them, Behold we go up to Jerusalem, and all things shall be accomplished which were written by the prophets concerning the Son of man: for He shall be delivered to the gentiles, and shall be mocked, and scourged, and spit upon; and after they have scourged Him, they will put Him to death; and the third day He shall rise again. And they understood none of these things, and this word was hid from them, and they understood not the things that were said. Now it came to pass, when He drew nigh to Jericho, that a certain blind man sat by the wayside, begging. And when he heard the multitude passing by, he asked what this meant. And they told him that Jesus of Nazareth was passing by. And he cried out, saying, Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me. And they that went before, rebuked him, that he should hold his peace: but he cried out much more, Son of David, have mercy on me. And Jesus standing, commanded him to be brought unto Him: and when he was come near, He asked him, saying, What wilt thou that I do to thee? But he said, Lord, that I may see. And Jesus said to him, Receive thy sight: thy faith hath made thee whole. And immediately he saw, and followed Him, glorifying God: and all the people when they saw it, gave praise to God.

Offertory: *Psalm 118: 12, 13.* Blessed art Thou, O Lord, teach me Thy justifications: with my lips I have pronounced all the judgments of Thy mouth.

Secret: May this offering, we beseech Thee, O Lord, cleanse away our sins, sanctify us in soul and body, and fit us, Thy servants, for the celebration of the sacrifice. Through our Lord.

Communion: Psalm 77: 29, 30. They did eat, and were filled exceedingly, and the Lord gave them their desire: they were not defrauded of that which they craved.

Postcommunion: We beseech Thee, O almighty God, that we, who have partaken of heavenly nourishment, may be fortified by it against all adversities. Through our Lord.

Fasting Rules

All Catholics having attained their 14th year are required to abstain from flesh meat on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent. Those aged 18 through 59 are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On a fast day, only one full meal may be taken, but one could add two smaller meals which together do not equal a full meal.

Although the fasting and abstinence detailed above is what is required of Catholics, all of the days of Lent are designated by the universal law of the Church as days of penance "on which the Christian faithful devote themselves in a special way to prayer, perform works of piety and charity, and deny themselves by fulfilling their own obligations more faithfully and especially by observing fast and abstinence, according the norm of the [above cited] canons." (CIC Can. 1249).

Spiritual Reading for Lent

This Lent, we would like to recommend the reading of an amazing book by Saint Alphonsus of Liguori called Preparation for Death.

The book has as its goal to make us consider the vanity of the things of this world and to place our attention on the things that really matter, preparing us for the "hour of truth", our own Judgment, which is coming soon. You can find the book downstairs in Nancy's Shop.

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FORTY HOURS DEVOTION

FEBRUARY 11-FEBRUARY 13

The devotion of the Forty Hours has a long and venerable history in the Church. Although it can be observed at different times of the year, it originally spread throughout Christian Europe as an act of reparation for the sins committed during *Carnavale*, the days of riotous celebration before Ash Wednesday.

This year St. Mary's Oratory will offer the Forty Hours devotion from Sunday, February 11 through Tuesday, February 13.

It will serve as a powerful preparation for the season of Lent.

The Sunday Mass will be followed by Eucharistic procession, and the Blessed Sacrament will remain exposed until the closing Mass on Tuesday evening. During the perpetual adoration, Mass and the Divine Office will be celebrated before the Blessed Sacrament exposed, in accordance with the rubrics.
