PRAYERS & INSTRUCTION

St. Joseph the Worker

The phrase “St. Joseph the Worker” usually evokes an image of the pious, dignified person of St. Joseph working quietly as a carpenter, with square in hand and other tools aside some chiseled wood in his workshop. This image- he and his attitude toward work- is exactly what we should be emulating.

The feast of St. Joseph the Worker was instituted by Pope Pius XII in 1955. The date was chosen to coincide with the day on which communist countries celebrated the workers’ servitude to the state. A feast in honor of this most honorable silent worker and provider, St. Joseph, who elevates and sanctifies honest work, bringing to light its dignity, moral, and spiritual value.

Labor is rooted in human nature and is a necessary condition of all human beings. It is a means for man’s existence, and through it he brings forth his talents and uses them to raise his standard of living. In our fast-paced and demanding world many forget that work is for man, not man for work. Work will either enrich us



as persons who are to “subdue the earth,” or it will dehumanize us, as in the case of those who enslaves themselves in the inordinate pursuit of gain.

On the other hand, man was not created for leisure; rather man was always destined to work, even in the garden of Eden, but in this case it was always a

pleasure. St. Benedict asserted that idleness was the enemy of the soul and insisted that his monks participate in manual labor every day.

Neither is it just an personal matter, but serves also a social function, as a tool to praise God, and as a means of assisting our neighbor. When we offers up our toils and labors, our work becomes a prayer ascending to heaven all the day long. This is reflected in the motto of the Benedictines “To labor is to pray.” St. Francis de Sales also claims that labor serves to mortify and subdue the flesh: “*Provided the labor you undertake contributes to the glory of God and your own welfare, I would prefer that you should suffer the pain of labor rather than that of fasting, ...*” [Introduction to the Devote Life](#)

Hence, work is part of our spirituality, for through it we can come closer to God, our Creator and Redeemer, in such a way that we participation in continuing the redemptive work of Christ. He was always doing the work of the One who sent Him (John 9:3-4) and we are invited by grace to do likewise.

ST. JOSEPH THE WORKER



INTROIT Sap. 10,17: Wisdom rendered to the just the wages of their labors, and conducted them in a wonderful way: and she was to them for a covert by day, and for the light of stars by night, alleluia, alleluia Ps 126:1 Unless the Lord build the house, they labor in vain who build it. Glory be. Wisdom rendered to the just the wages ...

COLLECT I: O God, Creator of all things, Who dost impose on man the law of work; grant in Thy goodness that, by the example and patronage of blessed Joseph, we may both accomplish the work Thou dost command and attain the reward Thou hast promised. Who livest.

COLLECT II: O God, Who by the humility of Thy Son hast lifted up a fallen world, grant that to those whom Thou hast delivered from the misfortunes of eternal death, Thou mayest insure everlasting happiness. Through the same

LESSON Col. 3, 14-15,17,23-24: Brethren: Have charity, which is the bond of perfection. And let the peace of Christ rejoice in your hearts, wherein also you are called in one body: and be ye thankful. JOSEPH: It is truly meet and just, right and for our salvation, that we should at all times and in all places, give thanks unto Thee, O holy Lord, Father almighty, everlasting God: and that we should magnify with due praises, bless and proclaim Thee on the solemnity of blessed Joseph; who, being a just man, was given by Thee as a Spouse to the Virgin Mother of God, and, as a faithful and prudent servant was set over Thy Family, that, with fatherly care, he might guard Thine only-begotten Son, conceived by the overshadowing of the Holy Ghost, even Jesus Christ, our Lord. Through whom the Angels praise Thy Majesty, the Dominations worship it, and the Powers stand in awe. The heavens and the heavenly hosts together with the blessed Seraphim in triumphant chorus unite to celebrate it. Together with them we entreat Thee that Thou mayest bid our voices also to be admitted, while we say with lowly praise: Holy.

LAST GOSPEL *John 10, 11-16*: At that time, Jesus said to the Pharisees, I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd giveth His life for His sheep; but the hireling, and he that is not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming, and leaveth the sheep, and flieth; and the wolf catcheth, and scattereth the sheep: and the hireling flieth because he is a hireling, and he hath no care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd; and I know Mine, and Mine know Me. As the Father knoweth Me, and I know the Father, and I lay down My life for My sheep. And other sheep I have, that are not of this fold; them also I must bring, and they shall hear My voice, and there shall be one fold, and one shepherd.

PUNCTUALITY: THE POLITENESS OF KINGS!

King Louis XVIII once suggested a honorable approach in which a sovereign can show respect for his subjects, and this was to always meet them at the appointed time. Now if this is so for a king, should it not be so for anyone else? Who amongst us would dare be late or unprepared to receive their guest of honor? A great embarrassment that would be, indeed.

Yet, we all know that the King of kings is present here in our church,

Time then, dear Christian souls, for some good resolutions as we dawn on the bright seasons ahead of us! Let us do our utmost in being sure not let the King of kings wait for us when the

bells of our conscience ring, calling us to Holy Mass on Sunday.

We come a distance, yes indeed, a sacrifice which God will not forget, but all the more then is the need to give ourselves more allowances for the unforeseen, for the unexpected. Let us not be stingy with out time for God, then we can be certain He will be generous with us also, for God has not been known to be outdone in generosity.
