CHRISTIAN COURAGE

THE more deeply your heart, dear reader, is imbued with a true fear of God (the gift of *Fear of the Lord*), so much the more will this fear rule and guide you in every circumstance of life, so much the less will you know any other fear, and so much the more courageously will you at all times and in all places range yourself on the side of God before the eyes of the world.

In our own day it is more necessary than ever to courageously stand up for the cause of Christ. All Christians, but in the first place all men, both old and young, must show themselves to be the courageous apostles of Christ, must fearlessly espouse His cause before all the world, in every position of life. That is a high and glorious vocation. Grace can give courage even to those who are naturally timid; but we must not expect grace to do this without out coop-

eration. The virtue of fortitude has been given to all Christian, and in this sense is an infused virtue; however, it remains for us to activate it by practice, and in this sense it becomes an acquired virtue.

Remember that Christ has said: "Everyone that shall confess me before men, I will also confess him before My Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 3, 32) This open confession of faith in Jesus Christ and the truths He has revealed, this fearless espousal of His cause, is demanded especially in our times. Modern society is to a great extent anti-Christian or inimical to Christ, with a pervaded hatred of Christianity in general, and of the Catholic Church in particular.

The contemptuous cry of on Good Friday: "We will not have this man to reign over us!" is today the battle-cry of His enemies. Therefore is Christianity to be ex-

SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST



Introit. Ps. 27, 8, 9. The Lord is the strength of His people, and the protector of the salvation of His anointed: save, O Lord, Thy people, and bless Thy inheritance, and rule them for ever. Ps. 27, 1. Unto Thee will I cry, O Lord: O my God, be not Thou silent to me, lest if Thou be silent to me, I become like them that go down into the pit. V. Glory.

Prayers. O God of virtues, to Whom belongeth every excellent thing, implant in our hearts the love of Thy name, and bestow upon us the increase of religion, fostering what things are good, and, by Thy loving care, guarding what Thou hast fostered. Through our Lord.

Epistle. Rom. 6, 3-11. Brethren, all we who are baptized in Christ Jesus are baptized in His death. For we are buried together with Him by baptism unto death; that as Christ is risen from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we also may walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall also be in the likeness of His resurrection. Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with Him, that the body of sin may be destroyed, and that we may serve sin no longer. For He that is dead is justified from sin. Now if we be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall live also together with Christ. Knowing that Christ, rising again from the dead, dieth now no more, death shall no more have dominion over Him. For in that He died to sin He died once; but in that He liveth, He liveth unto God. So do you also reckon yourselves to be dead indeed to sin, but alive to God; in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Gradual. Ps. 89, 13, 1. Return, O Lord, a little; and be entreated in favor of Thy servants. V. Lord, Thou hast been our refuge from generation to generation.

Alleluia, alleluia. V. Ps. 30, 2, 3. In Thee, O Lord, have I hoped, let me never be confounded: deliver me in Thy justice, and release me: bow down Thy ear to me, make haste to deliver me. Alleluia.

Gospel. Mark 8, 1-9. At that time, when there was a great multitude with Jesus, and had nothing to eat, calling His disciples together He saith to them, I have compassion on the multitude, for behold they have now been with Me three days, and have nothing to eat; and if I shall send them away fasting to their home they will faint in the way: for some of them came from afar off. And His disciples answered Him, From whence can any one fill them here with bread in the wilderness? And He asked them, How many loaves have ye? who said Seven. And He commanded the people to sit down on the ground. And taking the seven loaves, giving thanks He broke, and gave to his disciples to set before them; and they set them before the people. And they had a few little fishes, and He blessed them, and commanded them to be set before them. And they did eat, and were filled, and they took up that which was left of the fragments, seven baskets: and they that had eaten were about four thousand: and He sent them away.

Offertory. Ps. 16, 5, 6, 7. Perfect Thou my goings in Thy paths, that my footsteps be not moved: incline Thy ear, and hear my words: show forth Thy wonderful mercies, Thou Who savest them that trust in Thee, O Lord.

Secret. Be propitious to our supplications, O Lord, and graciously accept these offerings of Thy people; and, that the prayer of none may be without effect, the petition of none vain, grant that what we ask in faith we may effectually obtain. Through our Lord.

Communion. Ps. 26, 6. I will go round, and offer up in His tabernacle a sacrifice of jubilation; I will sing, and recite a psalm to the Lord.

Postcommunion. We have been filled with Thy gifts, O Lord; grant we beseech Thee, that by their effect we may be both cleansed and fortified. Through our Lord.

pelled from the school, from the daily press, and from legislature. And for the selfsame reason, the daily press becomes ever more and more unchristian: ever more shamelessly and impudently are immoral novels disseminated, a truly scandalous kind of literature.

Therefore it is of the utmost importance that the generation of Catholics who are now growing up, I mean Catholic young men, should fearlessly and courageously come forward and espouse the cause of Christ. Even the dread of death ought to induce no one to hold back, much less the dread of temporal loss. God will know how to protect His own in case of need. Think for a moment, what the faithful adherents of our holy

religion have endured since the so-called Reformation in England and Ireland. Consider the millions of early Christians who shed their blood for Christ, amid the most cruel tortures. Those who confessed themselves to be adherents of the Christian religion were robbed and deprived by the state of their private property; yet the Christians bore all this for quite three centuries.

Sacrifices like these are not yet required of us; we are not yet threatened with similar penalties. We ought, therefore, to find it easier to take the side of Christ, and to fight for His cause more cheerfully... you ought to have the courage of your convictions and act in accordance with your religious principles

even if you thereby antagonize or displease the one who gives you employment. *"Many souls say, 'I have not the strength to accomplish such an act.' But let them begin and put forth some effort! The good God never refuses the initial grace which imparts courage to act. After that, the heart is strengthened, and the soul goes on from victory to victory."*

In this manner must we all use every possible exertion in order that, in the days in which we live, Christ may once more reign in the whole of our public life.
