2. Truly **Catholic:** The program offers a nurturing spiritual environment, with daily Masses (*E.F. and O.F. daily*), rosary, stations of the cross, adoration, and the guidance of a full-time chaplain for spiritual direction.

3. **Recreational:** In addition to academic pursuits, students will enjoy daily recreational activities, sports, games, and off-campus trips to Boston, Clark Museum, Connecticut River, etc.

## Tarcisius's Teaching: St John's Fire - 2

Why does the Church especially honor Saint John the Baptist?

Pope Benedict XVI gives us some answers: "the liturgy celebrates the birth of John the Baptist, because it is closely linked to the mystery of the Incarnation of the Son of God. From the maternal womb, John is the precursor of Jesus: his prodigious conception is announced by the angel to Mary, as a sign that 'nothing is impossible with God'".

Indeed, John the Baptist was sanctified even before his birth by the Visitation of the Virgin Mary, carrying Christ in her womb!

"Prophet of the Most High", his birth announces the approach of redemption and thus opens a new chapter in the history of humanity!

Prophet, apostle, doctor, solitary, virgin, martyr, he is more than all these, because he is all these at the same time. He brings together all the titles to holiness, and, gathering in himself alone all that constitutes the different classes of saints, he forms among them a particular class.

As it is a solemnity, there is a penitential vigil\* on the evening of the 23<sup>rd</sup>. But the penance ends with the 1<sup>st</sup> Vespers which starts the festivity. After the Vespers, we traditionally light and bless a fire, around which we gather and celebrate.

Here at St. Paul's Oratory, we love tradition... so be it.

\* This year there will be no penance: it is a Sunday, and Our Lord obviously prevails on his cousin...

## Tarcisius's Teaching: Which Missal - 7

The Votive Masses of the Saints are divided on two kinds:

- Those who have a day assigned to it and those who have not. Those who have not a time assigned can be said at anytime where it is possible, as a special devotion towards this Mystery of Our Lord or this Saint...

Those who have a time assigned to it, can also be said at any time where it is possible... "So why a distinction? To make it more difficult for no reason?" Nope. There is a good reason: the Church encourage some special devotions on some days:

- Monday: Holy Trinity.
- Tuesday: Holy Angels.
- Wednesday: St. Joseph, St. Peter & Paul, All the Apostles...
- Thursday: Holy Ghost, Holy Eucharist, Our Lord Eternal & Sovereign Priest.
- Friday: Holy Cross, Holy Passion of Our Lord.
- Saturday: Our Lady.

Why do I tell you that? Maybe to give you the idea to add some special devotions to personal or familial prayers on those day, on a weekly basis...
