ELEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Introit: *Psalm 67: 6, 7, 36.* God in His holy place; God Who maketh men of one mind to dwell in a house: He shall give power and strength to His people. *Ps. 67: 2.* Let God arise, and let His enemies be scattered: and let them that hate Him flee from before His face. *V.* Glory be. God in.

Collect: Almighty, eternal God, Who, in the abundance of Thy loving-kindness, dost exceed both the deserts and the hopes of Thy suppliants, pour forth Thy mercy upon us, to take away from us those things which our conscience feareth, and to add that which our prayer presumeth not to ask. Through our Lord.

Epistle: I Corinthians 4: 1-10. Brethren, I make known unto you the gospel which I preached to you, which also you have received, and wherein you stand; by which also you are saved, if you hold fast after what manner I preached unto you, unless you have believed in vain. For I delivered unto you first of all, which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures; and that He was seen by Cephas, and after that by the eleven. Then was He seen by more than five hundred brethren at once; of whom many remain until this present, and some are fallen asleep. After that He was seen by James, then by all the apostles. And last of all He was seen also by me, as by one born out of due time. For I am the least of the apostles, who am not worthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the Church of God; but by the grace of God I am what I am; and His grace in me hath not been void.

Gradual: *Psalm 27: 7, 1.* In God hath my heart confided, and I have been helped; and my flesh hath flourished again; and with my will I will give praise to Him. *V.* Unto Thee will I cry, O Lord: O my God, be not Thou silent; depart not from me. Alleluia, alleluia. *V. Ps. 80: 2, 3.* Rejoice in God our helper; sing aloud to the God of Jacob: take a pleasant psalm with the harp. Alleluia.

Gospel: *St. Mark 7: 31-37.* At that time, Jesus going out to the coasts of Tyre, came by Sidon to the sea of Galilee, through the midst of the coasts of Decapolis. And they bring to Him one deaf and dumb, and they besought Him that He would lay His hand upon him. And taking him from the multitude apart, He put His fingers into his ears, and spitting, He touched his tongue; and looking up to heaven, He groaned and said to him, Ephpheta, that is, Be thou opened: and immediately his ears were opened, and the string of his tongue was loosed, and he spoke right. And He charged them that they should tell no man: but the more He charged them so much the more a great deal did they publish it; and so much the more did they wonder, saying, He hath done all things well; He hath made both the deaf to hear, and the dumb to speak.

Offertory: *Psalm 29: 2, 3.* I will extol Thee, O Lord, for Thou hast upheld me; and hast not made my enemies to rejoice over me: O Lord, I have cried to Thee, and Thou hast healed me.

Secret: Look with mercy, we beseech Thee, O Lord, upon our homage, that the gift we offer may be accepted by Thee and be the support of our frailty. Through our Lord.

Communion: *Proverbs 3: 9, 10.* Honor the Lord with thy substance, and with the first of all thy fruits: and thy barns shall be filled with abundance, and thy presses shall run over with wine.

Postcommunion: By receiving Thy sacrament, we beseech Thee, O Lord, may we experience help in soul and body, that, being saved in both, we may glory in the fullness of our heavenly remedy. Through our Lord.

THE PILGRIM VIRGIN OF FATIMA STATUE

The Pilgrim Virgin of Fatima is waiting for your family to adopt her for a week or two. One of the most effective means of bringing Our Blessed Mother to the attention of luke-warm Christians is "The Pilgrim Virgin."

This practice originated at Fatima on the 30th anniversary (May 13th, 1947) of Our Lady's first Apparition there. On that date the Bishop of Leiria blessed two statues of Our Lady of Fatima and sent them on distant pilgrimages—one to the Far East, the other to the West. The statues are exact replicas of the official one, which was made according to the instructions of Sr. Lucia, and which is venerated in the Chapel of the Apparitions at Cova da Iria. There is reason to believe that Our Blessed Mother herself inspired this beneficial practice of "The Pilgrim Virgin." It has many times received the blessing and the approval of the Holy Father.

The basic idea of the Pilgrim Virgin is this: Most people are unable to make a pilgrimage to Fatima. Our Lady, with characteristic humility and love, overcomes this difficulty by reversing the process. She becomes the Pilgrim. Instead of your making a pilgrimage to her home at Fatima, she makes a pilgrimage to yours. Proper Attire in Church

Now that the warm summer weather is here, just a friendly reminder about the importance of coming to church decently attired. Although it can be tempting to dress with comfort primarily in mind, out of respect for God's house and out of consideration for the dignity of the human person, it is important to dress with modesty and decorum. Revealing or tight-fitting clothing does not meet the norms for Christian modesty, especially in church. Gentlemen are kindly asked not to wear shorts. Ladies and girls should wear skirts and dresses falling at least below the knee (no exposed backs or shoulders) and are encouraged to have their heads covered, keeping with the apostolic tradition.

Holy Mass here is celebrated in the traditional Latin Rite. This was the form of worship in use in the Western world from antiquity until 1970. If you are unfamiliar with the traditional Latin Mass, do not hesitate to approach the priests with any questions you may have.

All practicing Catholics in the state of grace are invited to approach the altar rail for Holy Communion. In the traditional Roman Rite, Holy Communion is received kneeling (unless you are impaired from doing so) and on the tongue. The mouth should be open with the tongue slightly extended. You do not look at the priest and you do not say Amen.

The baptistery in the back of the church functions as a crying room during the Mass. Please feel free to make use of it when you have a crying child by exiting quietly down one of the side aisle.

If you are not Catholic, we invite you to learn about our faith. The Church was founded over 2000 years ago by Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. If you are interested in becoming Catholic or learning more about the Catholic faith, please do not hesitate to contact us. The priests of the Oratory offer individual instruction. We look forward to hearing from you.

What does it mean to pray for the intentions of the Holy Father?

The conditions for obtaining a plenary indulgence are Sacramental Confession within about a week's time, reception of Holy Communion, and reciting some prayers (at least one Our Father and one Hail Mary) for the intentions of the Holy Father. This is different from praying for the Holy Father himself, as we do at Mass. What, precisely, does it mean to pray for his intentions?

According to the Church's official decree on indulgences, the Pope's intention, in virtue of his office, always includes the following objects:

- 1. The progress of the Faith and triumph of the Church.
- 2. Peace and union among Christian Princes and Rulers.
- 3. The conversion of sinners.
- 4. The uprooting of heresy.

It is good for you to have these specific intentions in mind when you pray for the Holy Father's intentions. Even if you do not think of them specifically, however, your prayer is still valid, as they are included in the intention of Holy Mother Church. Of course the Pope may have other personal intentions, but it is not necessary that these form a part of your prayer.
