March for Life

In five days, hundreds of thousands of people will descend upon our nation's capital for the largest annual protest manifestation, the March for Life. This is the 50th anniversary of Roe v. Wade, and thus marks the 50th year that abortion has been legal from conception to birth across the entire US.

It is our responsibility as faithful Catholics to make our presence known at the March for Life in Washington, and if that is simply not feasible, then perhaps the NJ Rally in Trenton NJ on Jan. 21st. Our civil leaders must see the Gospel of Life alive, for too many do not fight for life because they believe the culture of death has won. As the number of people grows at the March for Life so does the impact of the event.

Most important of all, we must pray to end abortion. Action that is not guided by and supported with prayer does not bear the fruit that it could (and should.) Many attend marches and protests one day of the year, but do not properly stand for the Gospel the other 364 days. We must not allow ourselves to be among that sad group.

During this time after Christmas, we still remember the Nativity of Our Divine Saviour, and the Blessed Virgin's nine months with child. Blessed is the fruit of her womb. Blessed is every child, and we must pray that all children are born with loving parents just as the Infant Jesus was.

CANDLEMAS CANDLES

The Confraternity of the Holy Rosary will be taking orders 100% beeswax candles for home use. These candles will be solemnly blessed at on the feast of the Purification (Candlemas- Feb. 2nd) and distributed the following Sunday. Please see the order form in the vestibule in the coming weeks for information.

It is customary to bring candles from home to be blessed -- at least 51% beeswax candles that one uses for devotional purposes (candles for the family altar, Advent candles, etc.) -- so they can be lit after dusk on All Saints' Day, during the administration of Extreme Unction, and during storms or times of trouble.

INTROIT. *Ps. 65, 4.* Let all the earth adore Thee, O God, and sing to Thee: let it sing a psalm to Thy name, O Thou most high. *Ps. 65, 1, 2.* Shout with joy to God all the earth, Sing ye a psalm to His name, give glory to His praise. *V.* Glory.

PRAYER. Almighty, eternal God, Who dost govern all things in heaven and on earth, of Thy mercy hear the supplications of Thy people, and grant Thy peace in our times. Through.

EPISTLE. *Rom. 12, 6-16.* Brethren, having different gifts, according to the grace that is given us; either prophecy, to be used according to the rule of faith; or ministry, in ministering; or he that teacheth in doctrine; he that exhorteth in exhorting; he that giveth with simplicity; he that ruleth with carefulness; he that showeth mercy with cheerfulness. Let love be without dissimulation. Hating that which is evil, cleaving to that which is good. Loving one another with the charity of brotherhood, in honor preventing one another. In carefulness, not slothful: in spirit fervent: serving the Lord: rejoicing in hope: patient in tribulation: instant in prayer: communicating to the necessities of the saints; pursuing hospitality. Bless them that persecute you: bless, and curse not. Rejoice with them that rejoice, weep with them that weep. Being of one mind one towards another; not minding high things, but consenting to the humble.

GRADUAL. *Ps. 106, 20, 21.* The Lord sent His word, and healed them: and delivered them out of their distresses. *V.* Let the mercies of the Lord give glory to Him: and His wonderful works to the children of men.

ALLELUIA, ALLELUIA. *V. Ps. 148, 2.* Praise ye the Lord, all His angels: praise ye Him, all His hosts. Alleluia.

GOSPEL. *John 2, 1-11.* At that time, there was a marriage in Cana of Galilee: and the mother of Jesus was there. And Jesus also was invited, and His disciples, to the marriage. And

the wine failing, the mother of Jesus saith to Him, They have no wine. And Jesus saith to her, Woman, what is it to Me and to thee? My hour is not yet come. His mother saith to the waiters, Whatsoever He shall say to you, do ye. Now there were set there six water pots of stone, according to the manner of the purifying of the Jews, containing two or three measures apiece. Jesus saith to them, Fill the water pots with water. And they filled them up to the brim. And Jesus saith to them, Draw out now, and carry to the chief steward of the feast: and they carried it. And when the chief steward had tasted the water made wine, and knew not whence it was, but the waiters knew who had drawn the water: the chief steward calleth the bridegroom, and saith to him, Every man at first setteth forth good wine, and when man have well drank, then that which is worse: but thou hast kept the good wine until now. This beginning of miracles did Jesus in Cana of Galilee; and manifested His glory, His disciples believed in Him.

OFFERTORY. *Ps. 65, 1, 2, 16.* Shout with joy to God, all the earth: sing ye a psalm to His name: come and hear, and I will tell you, all ye that fear God, what great things the Lord hath done for my soul. Alleluia.

SECRET. Sanctify, O Lord, the gifts we offer, and purify us from the stains of our sins. Through our Lord.

COMMUNION. *John 2, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11.* The Lord saith: Fill the water pots with water, and carry to the chief steward of the feast. When the chief steward had tasted the water made wine, he saith to the bridegroom: thou hast kept the good wine until now; this first miracle did Jesus before His disciples.

POSTCOMMUNION. May the working of Thy power, we beg Thee, O Lord, be increased in us, that being nourished by divine sacraments, we may by Thy grace be prepared to obtain that which they promise. Through our Lord.

INFORMATION FOR NEWCOMERS

Welcome to St. Anthony of Padua Oratory and the traditional Latin Mass offered by the *Institute of Christ the King Sovereign Priest*. We are pleased to have you join us in this venerable act of worship and invite you to return often.

In the traditional Mass, each person has his proper role; be it celebrant, server, choir, usher, or congregation. At High Mass, the choir makes all sung responses, and at Low Mass it is the function solely of the server, since this was the vision of the Church, aided by the Holy Ghost, for numerous centuries. The congregation respond internally as opposed to vocally, and this is still, according to Pope Pius XII in his encyclical *"Mystici Corporis"* active participation. We must always remember that active participation in all its facets begins in the heart, for without which our prayers are but empty shells.

While silent meditation or fervent recitation of the Holy Rosary have always been regarded as active participation, it is highly recommended that to assist at the Mass more fully we follow the prayers of the Mass. For this purpose, please use the pew missals provided paying particular attention to the notes in the margin. All the "propers," or parts of the Mass which are different according to the day, can be found in the bulletin or the handout on the tables in the rear of the church. Simply follow those around you when to stand, sit and kneel, and please keep a *"holy silence"* in the church at all times out of respect of Christ's presence in the tabernacle. Lastly, since there is no mixing of the old and new, Holy Communion is received on the tongue while kneeling.

A GENTLE REMINDER: ONLY PRACTICING CATHOLICS IN THE STATE OF GRACE (NOT HAVE UNCONFESED SERIOUS SIN ON ONE'S SOUL) ARE FREE TO RECEIVE COMMUNION.
