## ...I BELIEVE IN...THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS...



There are certain acts on the part of the penitent that are necessary to obtain pardon. These are three: **contrition**, **confession**, **satisfaction**. These three imply a previous **examination of conscience**, while true contrition includes a **firm purpose of amendment**. We can say, therefore, with the catechism, that we must do five things to receive the sacrament of Penance worthily. We will examine each of these in turn as a spiritual checkup this lent, to see if we are "up to snuff."

### Part II- STEP I: EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE

HE self-examination before confession is a summoning of ourselves before the secret tribunal of our own conscience to discover the sins we have committed since our last good confession. The effort we make to recall our sins should be honest and reasonable. If we go to confession regularly and in the habit of making a nightly examination of our past day, this will not take much time. But in view of the gravity of this act, Confession, we are obliged to spend a reasonable amount of time, particularly if we do not go often or have had the misfortune to commit grave sins. If a grave sin is omitted due to great negligence or hastiness in our examination of conscience, the absolution is invalid, and the confession is sacrilegious.

#### FOLLOWING A PLAN

There is no one plan of examination that is ideal for everyone. We should, of course, have a method, but we are free to use one we have been taught, or appeals to us. Our first question could be "have I fallen into serious sin?" If we are earnestly striving to serve Christ, we will know the answer to this question immediately, for if we have had the misfortune to commit a mortal sin it will be bothering us. If, on the other hand, we have acquired careless habits, we will need to examine ourselves thoroughly.

Perhaps our second question should deal with the sins into which we fall most frequently. We call such a sin a 'chief sin' or predominant fault. We should certainly check carefully on the deliberate venial sins, especially those that can lead easily to mortal sins.

In general however, our examination will follow the listed questions on the decalogue (10 Commandments), the precepts of the Church, the seven capital sins, and the duties of our state in life. We might have a simpler list with heading such as: duties to God, duties toward my neighbor, and duties toward myself; or prayer, work, and recreation; or per-

haps, thoughts, words, deeds, and omissions since my last confession.

#### CIRCUMSTANCES AND FREQUENCY

We should keep in mind that we are preparing to confess our sins to Jesus Christ Himself, represented by His minister. This will help us to be frank with ourselves, to word our accusations simply, briefly, and in terms meant to reveal our sins as God sees them. We must state any circumstances that alter the specific character of the sin, which change it from venial to mortal or greatly increase its gravity. We must be careful not to include extraneous details which merely lengthen the confession unnecessarily, trying the patience of the priest and those in the confessional line. For instance, it is not enough to say, "I told a lie," if the lie were told in court under oath. To do so would be concealing a mortal sin. But we need not say that "I lied, because my brother embarrassed me in front of my friends and I was forced to deny his comment in order to keep my general reputation that most of my friends have of me ...etc., etc., etc.". We must also tell the number of times each serious sin was committed.

#### **NECESSARY AND OPTIONAL MATTER**

For our peace of mind as well as to avoid scruples, it is necessary to keep a clear line of distinction between our obligation in this matter of confession and what is our greater spiritual advantage.

Imperfections are not in themselves matter for confession, but the Church allows us to confess them so that we may derive the greatest possible advantage from this great sacrament.

Such faults could be neglecting to hear Mass or receiving Communion on weekdays when we easily could do so, unkind words or deeds thoughtlessly committed, spontaneous manifestations of vanity, self-love, and selfishness, such as always speaking about ourselves and our plans, seeking the best for ourselves, or other manifest tendencies in the line of the seven capital sins.

We are obliged to confess only unconfessed mortal sins, which we are sure we have committed. Therefore, while we point out which venial offenses it is most spiritually advantageous for us to accuse ourselves of, we are always entirely free to confess whichever venial sins we choose and to mention them in confession. Besides, if, from past experience, we know a certain temptation is a danger to us, it is well to mention it, because the priest can suggest means of fighting it.

Common sense, of course, dictates that the matter of our confession should reflect the state of our souls. We will not confess a list of minor faults when we are often committing deliberate venial sins. However, when we only have undeliberate venial sins to confessed, we must mention a sin of our past life already forgiven, for which we are particularly sorry, in order to supply matter for the absolution, since most find it difficult to arouse sincere sorrow for small faults. If not, the absolution would be invalid since there is no sincere sorrow. In short, when confessing only venial sins, it is well to mention a more serious sin of our past life to help us be genuinely sorry.

#### GENERAL AND PARTICULAR EXAMEN

A general examination of conscience should be made daily, preferably in the evening, as a part of our night prayers. It is a brief, searching glance cast over our day's prayer, work, and play to discover any sinful thoughts, words, deeds, or omissions we may be guilty of. It is wise and practical to also check on our particular failing or sin, or on how we have striven to practice the opposite virtue. We call this latter a particular examine.

At another time we would do well to consider the different types of conscience. These are, a correct and false conscience, a certain and doubtful conscience, a lax and scrupulous conscience. However, it will need to wait, as the subject we are now reviewing is somewhat multifaceted already in itself.
