

...I BELIEVE IN...THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS...

There are certain acts on the part of the penitent that are necessary to obtain pardon. These are three: **contrition**, **confession**, **satisfaction**. These three imply a previous **examination of conscience**, while true contrition includes a **firm purpose of amendment**. *We can say, therefore, with the catechism, that we must do five things to receive the sacrament of Penance worthily*. We will examine each of these in turn as a spiritual checkup this Lent, to see if we are "up to snuff."

Part III: STEP II—TRUE CONTRITION

RAYER for guidance, the examination of conscience, and the exciting of contrition are not in separate "watertight" compartments, though we necessarily explain them in this order. They more or less intermingle. For instance, the moment we discover ourselves guilty of a certain sin, motives of sorrow may present themselves at once. Or if we find it difficult to own up to a certain sin, or feel attachment to it or its occasions, a prayer for light and strength is in order. Nevertheless, when we have completed our examination, in a particular way, we should calmly but earnestly seek to arouse the contrition which is the prime essential of a good confession.

CONTRITION AND THE VIRTUE OF PENANCE

The Council of Trent defined contrition as a "sorrow of heart and a detestation for sin committed, with the resolve to sin no more." One might think this sounds much like a definition for the virtue of penance?

The fact is, contrition or sorrow for sin is an exercise of the virtue of penance; likewise an act of contrition is an act of this virtue. This virtue is a necessary condition for forgiveness. It is, in fact, the very heart and essence of the sacrament of Penance. We can easily understand this if we pause to recall that the essentials of the virtue of penance-contrition and satisfactionare also essentials of the sacrament. The virtue of penance or repentance is the only means that people outside the Church have for the forgiveness of their sins.

WHAT IS CONTRITION?

Since contrition is the most important act of the penitent, let us examine its nature and see exactly what it is.

The word 'contrition' is derived from the Latin verb *conterere*, meaning to grind together or pulverize. Contrition, therefore, means a grinding down of something that is hardened.

DEFINITION OF CONTRITION

Now let us see if we can define contrition in precise terms. Keeping in mind the teaching of the Council of Trent and what we have said concerning the virtue of penance, we may define contrition as follows: *CONTRITION OR SORROW FOR SIN IS A SUPERNATURAL ACT OF THE WILL, BY WHICH WE DETEST THE SINS WE HAVE COMMITTED AND ARE HEARTI-LY SORRY FOR THEM, WITH A FIRM PUR-POSE OF SINNING NO MORE.*

We can underscore four distinct elements in this definition: (1.) an act of the will, (2.) hatred for sin, (3.) sorrow for sin, and (4.) a purpose of sinning no more.

(1.) An act of the will. We have seen that sin is an act of the will by which we turn away from God. Contrition must therefore be a reverse act of that same will, for with the will we have sinned. Contrition is a free act of the will that, under the inspiration of grace and for supernatural motives, turns away from the sins committed and turns towards God.

(2.) *Hatred for sin*. Hatred or detestation for sin is the first step in contrition. By hatred for sin, we mean judging the sins we have committed as the greatest of evils because by them we have attacked and offended God. The consequence is a deliberate aversion or turning from them by our will. Unless we hate and detest the sins that have been the cause of our losing or lessening God's friendship, we cannot hope to regain or retain that friendship.

(3.) *Sorrow for sin*. Hatred for sin is accompanied by sorrow for sin. Our detestation of our sins as the greatest of evils gives rise to sorrow or regret for having committed them. This sorrow must be inspired by supernatural motives that have reference to God, such as

the goodness and holiness of God, the foulness of sin, loss of eternal happiness, and the fear of hell and God's punishment. Natural motives are useless for the forgiveness of sin; these include regret for sin because it might involve loss of reputation, friends, and health, or because it might incur civil punishment. When we regret our sins by an act of the will, inspired by one or several supernatural motives, we have true contrition, though we may not feel sorry for them. Being sorry, as an act of the will, is quite independent of feeling sorry, which may be merely emotional. While such emotional feelings may assist us, they are not necessary to true contrition. Therefore, with the help of God's grace, we are always capable of making a genuine act of contrition.

(4.) *Purpose of sinning no more.* There is no real contrition without a firm purpose of amendment since these are so closely connected. Since this is usually handled separately, we shall defer further treatment of it until a little later.

NECESSITY OF CONTRITION

Having mentioned the necessity of contrition several times, we again call attention to it because it is so very important.

Perfect contrition was the only means of obtaining forgiveness of serious sins before the coming of Christ. Contrition for sin is the heart of the sacrament of Penance instituted by Christ. Unless a person has at least attrition, or imperfect sorrow, for his sins the absolution of the priest is powerless to effect his forgiveness. We can hardly exaggerate the importance of contrition for sin, so we will touch on this again in the next issue in this series.
