Hotdogs/hamburgers/brats will be provided, however please bring a side dish or dessert, and beverages. Also, please consider volunteering for this event, we need your help.



ntroit. Ps 26, 7, 8, 9. Hear, O Lord, my voice with which I have cried to Thee, alleluia: my heart hath said to Thee, I have sought Thy face, Thy face, O Lord, I will seek: turn not away Thy face from me, alleluia, alleluia. Ps. 26, 1. The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? V. Glory.

**P**rayer. Almighty and eternal God, make us ever bear a devout affection toward Thee, and with sincere heart to serve Thy majesty. Through our Lord.

**E** pistle. 1 Peter 4, 7-11. Dearly beloved, be prudent, and watch in prayers. But before all things have a constant mutual charity among yourselves; for charity covereth a multitude of sins. Using hospitality one toward another without murmuring. As every man hath received grace, ministering the same one to another; as good stewards of the manifold grace of God. If any man speak, let him speak as the words of God. If any man minister, let him do it as of the power which God administers; that in all things God may be honored through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

## <u>My Holy Catholic Faith</u>

#### When does a person sin by superstition?

A person sins by superstition when he attributes to a creature a power that belongs to God alone.

A person does so when he makes use of lucky charms, spells, believes in dreams or fortune-telling, etc. Even party games, such as reading palms, tea leaves, etc. are dangerous and at times sinful.

Superstition is by its nature a mortal sin, but it may be venial either when the matter is slight or when there is a lack of full consent to the act. Often this sin is not mortal when there is a question of certain popular superstitions, for example, belief in unlucky days and numbers, or when superstitious acts are performed as a joke without any serious thought of attributing divine powers to a creature, or when these acts are performed for amusement. Nevertheless these are still most displeasing to God.

But there are Catholics who are more or less seriously addicted to superstitious practices, such as avoiding thirteen at table, reading tea-leaves, knocking on wood, etc. Some even engage in more serious superstitious practices, such as consulting fortune tellers or spiritistic mediums. These practices are a violation of the first commandment of God, inasmuch as they attribute to created things that God reserves to Himself.

But you may ask, *Are not these medals, scapulars, etc., that we wear, also charms?* No. These things are blessed and worn in honor of God, of His Blessed Mother, or of the saints. We do not expect any help from the little piece of brass or cloth we wear, but from those in whose honor we wear it, and from the prayers said in the

blessing of those who wear it. But they who wear charms expect the help from the thing itself, which makes their conduct foolish and sinful, since God alone can protect from evil. Again, such things as medals, crosses, and scapulars are blessed by the Church and worn by its consent, and it could never allow all its children to do a sinful thing. It is good and praiseworthy, therefore, to wear the blessed sacramentals in God's honor; but even with these holy things we must be careful not to go too far. It is true Our Lady will protect those who wear her scapular; but it would be sinful willfully to expose ourselves to danger without any necessity, because we wear a scapular.
