INFANT KING NOVENA

~ said every 17th to 25th of each month ~

O Divine Infant Jesus, I have recourse to Thee. Please, through Thy Blessed Mother, assist me in this necessity (mention intention here), because I firmly believe that Thy Divinity can help me. I hope with confidence to obtain thy holy grace. I love Thee with all my heart and with all the strength of my soul. I repent sincerely of my sins and I beg Thee, O Good Jesus, to grant me the strength to triumph over them. I resolve never more to offend Thee and I come to offer myself to Thee with the intention of enduring everything rather than to displease Thee. Henceforth, I desire to serve Thee with fidelity and, for the love of Thee, O Divine Infant, I will love my neighbor as myself. All powerful Infant, O Jesus, I implore Thee again, assist me in this need. Grant me the grace of possessing Thee eternally with Mary and Joseph and of adoring Thee with the angels in the heavenly court. Amen.

St. Joseph of Cupertino

Joseph Desa was born into a poor family in the Kingdom of Naples on June 17, 1603. He was a unsuccessful, daydreamy, clumsy village cobbler's apprentice, who was turned down for admission by the Franciscans when 17.

With another attempt, he was finally admitted on probation, and was assigned to tend to the mules. Since he was gentle and affectionate, all the mules soon realized they could act as they pleased in his presence, and he was consequently dismissed after only eight months.

One of his Franciscan uncles, however, pulled some strings, and he finally became a Conventual Franciscan tertiary and servant in 1625. It was then that Joseph suddenly "took off" as it were — something he later became very famous for!

He soon became a model of angelic purity of spirit, of humility, of patience under severe criticism, and especially of obedience. In view of his poor scholarship, it was evident that Heaven itself taught him many of the profound things he knew. His priestly life of great mortification and obedience began with his ordination in 1628, including his legendary fasting which seemed to have left him with stomach trouble until his very death. He also suffered greatly in spirit for numerous of years.

Then came a profound peace and calm—and the levitations. St. Joseph of Cupertino levitated before reliable witnesses, sometimes hundreds of witnesses at once, at least 70 times in his life—far more than any other saint in Catholic history. He flew farther than the Wright brothers (and maybe faster) and is named the patron saint of air travelers.

A legendary preacher and confessor, his spiritual advice was well valued. His one counsel regarding scruples was and still is of great value: "I like neither scruples nor melancholy. Let your intention be right, and don't be afraid."

St. Joseph of Cupertino died on September 18, 1663, and canonized in 1767.

BRIDGE OF ROSES STORY OF OUR LADY OF THE CAPE

NTROIT. Ps. 85, 3, 5. Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I have cried to Thee all the day; for Thou, O Lord, art sweet and mild, and plenteous in mercy to all that call upon Thee. Ps. 85, 1. Bow down Thy ear to me, O Lord, and hear me; for I am needy and poor. V. Glory.

PAYER. Let Thy grace, we beseech Thee, O Lord, ever go before us and follow us, and may it make us to be continually zealous in doing good works. Through our Lord.

PISTLE. Eph. 3, 13-21. Brethren, I pray you not to faint at my tribulations for you, which are your glory. For this cause I bow my knees to the Father of Our Lord Jesus Christ, of Whom all paternity, in heaven and earth is named, that He would grant you, according to the riches of His Spirit with might unto the inward man. That Christ may dwell by faith in your hearts; that being rooted and founded in charity, you may be able to comprehend with all the saints, what is the breadth, and length, and height, and depth. To know also the charity of Christ, which surpasseth all knowledge; that you may be filled unto all the fullness of God. Now to Him Who is able to do all things more abundantly than we desire or understand, according to the power that worketh in us: to Him be glory in the Church, and in Christ Jesus, unto all generations, world without end. Amen.

GOSPEL. Luke 14, 1-11. At that time, when Jesus went into the house of one of the chiefs of the Pharisees on the Sab-

bath day to eat bread, they watched Him. And behold, there was a certain man before Him that had the dropsy: and Jesus answering, spoke to the lawyers and Pharisees, saying, Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath day? But they held their peace: but He taking him, healed him, and sent him away. And answering them, He said, Which of you shall have an ass or an ox fall into a pit, and will not immediately draw him out on the Sabbath day? And they could not answer Him these things. And He spoke a parable also to them that were invited, marking how they chose the first seats at the table, saying to them, When thou art invited to a wedding, sit not down in the first place, lest perhaps one more honorable than thou be invited by him; and he that invited thee and him, come and say to thee, Give this man place; and then thou begin with shame to take the lowest place. But when thou art invited, go sit down in the lowest place: that when he who inviteth thee cometh, he may say to thee, Friend, go up higher: then shalt thou have glory before them that sit at table with thee: because every one that exalteth himself shall be humbled, and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted.

INFORMATION FOR US ALL

Welcome to St. Anthony of Padua Oratory and the traditional Latin Mass offered by the *Institute of Christ the King Sovereign Priest*. We are pleased to have you join us in this venerable act of worship and invite you to return often.

In the traditional Mass, each person has his proper role, be it celebrant, server, chorister, usher, or member of the congregation. At High Mass, the choir makes all sung responses, and at Low Mass it is the function solely of the server, as this was the vision of the Church, aided by the Holy Ghost, for numerous centuries. The congregation respond internally as opposed to vocally, and this is still, according to Pope Pius XII in his encyclical *Mystici Corporis*, active participation. We must always remember that active participation in all its facets begins in the heart, without which our prayers are but empty shells.

While silent meditation or fervent recitation of the Holy Rosary have always been regarded as active participation, it is highly recommended that to assist at the Mass more fully we follow the prayers of the Mass. For this purpose, please use the pew missals provided, paying particular attention to the notes in the margin. All the "propers," or parts of the Mass which are different according to the day, can be found in the bulletin or the handout on the tables in the rear of the church. Simply follow those around you regarding when to stand, sit and kneel, and please keep a *holy silence* in the church at all times out of respect for Christ's presence in the tabernacle. Lastly, because there is no mixing of the old and new, Holy Communion is received on the tongue while kneeling.

A GENTLE REMINDER: ONLY PRACTICING CATHOLICS IN THE STATE OF GRACE (FREE FROM UNCONFESSED SERIOUS SIN) ARE FREE TO RECEIVE COMMUNION.
