I hope with confidence to obtain thy holy grace. I love Thee with all my heart and with all the strength of my soul. I repent sincerely of my sins and I beg Thee, O Good Jesus, to grant me the strength to triumph over them. I resolve never more to offend Thee and I come to offer myself to Thee with the intention of enduring everything rather than to displease Thee. Henceforth, I desire to serve Thee with fidelity and, for the love of Thee, O Divine Infant, I will love my neighbor as myself. All powerful Infant, O Jesus, I implore Thee again, assist me in this need. Grant me the grace of possessing Thee eternally with Mary and Joseph and of adoring Thee with the angels in the heavenly court. Amen

Good King Wenceslaus

E all know the name Good King Wenceslaus of the beloved Christmas carol; but he was much more than a familiar character, he was a saint.

Wenceslas (903-929) was the son of a Christian Duke of Bohemia, Vratislav I, whose family had been converted by Saints Cyril and Methodius, but his mother was a hard and cruel pagan, apparently receiving baptism on her wedding day without much faith. Through the care of his holy grandmother, St. Ludmilla, herself a martyr strangled to death by assassins hired by her daughter-in-law, Wenceslas was educated in the faith under secrecy, even receiving the sacraments by night.

On the death of his father in battle, his mother, Drahomira, usurped the government and passed a series of laws persecuting Christians. At the age of 18, Wenceslas, through the support of the people, reclaimed a large portion of the country as his own kingdom. But when he produced a male heir, his mother secured the apostasy and alliance of his brother Boleslaus.

St. Wenceslaus ruled as a brave and

pious king, providing for all the needs of his people, and built many churches. Having a particular horror of war, he is said to have overcome in single combat the leader of an invading army by a sign of the cross.

Yes, he really did go out on the Feast of St. Stephen, December 26, in the snow that was "deep and crisp and even," just as the carol teaches us. He saw a poor man gathering sticks of wood to keep warm, and finding out where the man lived, he had his page fetch meat, wine and logs, and tucking his royal robes into his boots, he trudged to the mountain hut to warm and feed the poor man.

But his piety was the occasion of his death. For after finally effecting a reconciliation with his mother and brother, he invited Boleslaus to a banquet on the feast of SS. Cosmas and Damian, September 27. The following morning he went to pray the office of Matins before the tabernacle. There at the church door, at the mere age of 26, he received his crown of martyrdom; the violent death-blow from his brother who had followed him thence.



NTROIT. Ps. 118, 137, 124. Thou art just, O Lord, and Thy judgment is right; deal with Thy servant according to Thy mercy. Ps. 118, 1. Blessed are the undefiled in the way: who walk in the law of the Lord. V. Glory.

PRAYER. Grant Thy people, we beseech Thee, O Lord, to shun the defilements of the devil, and with pure hearts to follow Thee, the only God. Through our Lord.

E PISTLE. Eph. 4, 1-6. Brethren, I, a prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that you walk worthy of the vocation in which you are called. With all humility and mildness, with patience, supporting one another in charity, careful to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace. One body and one spirit, as you are called in one hope of your calling. One Lord, one faith, one baptism. One God and Father of all, Who is above all, and through all, and in us all, Who is blessed for ever and ever.

GOSPEL. Matt. 22, 35-46. At that time, the pharisees came to Jesus, and one of them, a doctor of the law, asked Him, tempting Him, Master, which is the great commandment of the law? Jesus said to him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul, and with thy whole

mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. And the second is like to this: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments dependeth the whole law and the prophets. And the pharisees being gathered together, Jesus asked them, saying, What think you of Christ; Whose son is He? They say to Him, David's. He saith to them, How then doth David, in spirit, call Him Lord; saying, The Lord said to My Lord, Sit on My right hand until I make Thy enemies Thy footstool? If David then call Him Lord, how is He his son? And no man was able to answer Him a word; neither durst any man, from that day forth, ask Him any more questions.

OF CHRISTIAN CHEERFULNESS

L IKE A SWEET FRAGRANT flower by the roadside, whose bright loveliness is a joy to everyone who passes by, our cheerfulness is a blessing to all with whom we come in contact. Merely by being cheerful, one exerts a quiet yet potent influence for good. Let us bear this in mind, that we can be helpful to souls, that we can encourage them and strengthen them in good, simply by our cheerfulness and amiability. The author of <u>The Art of Being Happy</u> tells us:

"It is well to do our duty, but sometimes this is not enough for the happiness of others and our own. We must do our duty with joy, with eagerness, with love. We must not keep count of what we do, nor stop strictly and sternly at the exact limit of duty. Let us learn to devote ourselves generously, above all when there is question of fulfilling certain obligations of our state in life, position, etc., by which we do good to our brethren. Let us learn to show always a smiling face, although our work is distasteful to us or overwhelms us. And after having worked hard let us take care not to recall in conversation the pains we have taken, the fatigue that we have imposed upon ourselves. Then our duty accomplished will please everyone: God first, then men, and last of all our own poor heart."

Our Lord Himself has said: "Be of good cheer!" ... Jesus was indeed a man of sorrows, but He was not a sad man. His face must always have reflected the serenity of His soul. He was meek and humble, gentle and amiable. "He went about doing good to all."

Among the saints—the close followers of Christ—St. Francis de Sales pre-eminently commands our admiration and our love for his Christlike characteristics of cheerful serenity, meekness, humility, patience, charity, kindness, sweetness of temper, and suavity of deportment. Like Our Savior, the gentle Bishop of Geneva loved to make use of comparisons drawn from nature to illustrate his sermonsso replete with good cheer and helpfulness. There is great merit also in cheerfulness when it is cultivated from a supernatural motive; when it is the fruit of divine and fraternal charity. It requires self-control and self-denial to maintain cheerfulness under all circumstances – whether in sickness, pain, sorrow, poverty, misunderstanding, and in unpleasant surroundings. Christian cheerfulness implies something more than natural temperament; it means self -denial—self-control. Natural dispositions should not be offered as an excuse for being morose and rude.

The presence of a good and cheerful man acts like an invigorating tonic upon all around him. Nothing disturbs his equanimity, which springs from the peace of God in his heart. By the grace of God and with an earnest effort we can overcome our evil nature. You find yourself refreshed by the presence of cheerful persons? Why not make earnest efforts to be helpful to others by your own cheerfulness and amiability?
