FROM THE DESK OF THE RECTOR

Very dear faithful,

Today's Gospel is the well known passage from Saint Matthew of the master forgiving his servant's debt of 10,000 talents (a sum that is equivalent to daily wages for 60,000,000 days, or 164,384 years of wages). He was forgiven a large amount! This evil servant, however, refused to forgive another who owed him the equivalent of daily wages for 100 days. He himself was forgiven an amount that he could not possibly have paid back. There are lessons here for our lives.

Any offence to God is infinite simply because of the infinity of the Divine Majesty. The saints were numerous in declaiming the terrible nature of sin. Therefore, when God forgives us, we should most certainly be grateful to Him.

The Gospel goes further. Since the evil servant refused to forgive, and went so far as to torment and torture his debtor, the master gave to him as his punishment whatever he had been forgiven. This should bring to mind the fifth petition of the Our Father: *Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.*

Furthermore, we are called to be grateful. There is no better response to the gracious liberality of God than to be make use of the graces that He gives us and return to Him the fruits of our labor. Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary, pray for us. *Canon Sequeira*

TRANSUBSTANTIATION FOR BEGINNERS *(by Canon Francis Ripley, Source: catholicanswers.com)*

We shall never understand the New Testament unless we remember that these written accounts are simply versions of the verbal tradition. Paul and the evangelists knew what the Christians were doing. The words of consecration were being said at the Eucharistic meals. It was easy enough to write them down. There could have been no distortion, at the most only a simplification. Suppose we had been present with the apostles in those days between Christ's Resurrection and his Ascension. We should have heard Christ teaching them. Indeed this was a most important time of their training. Can we imagine that he would omit to tell them in detail how they were to carry on doing what he told them to do at his Last Supper? Christ knew and they knew that this was to be the very heart of the worship of the Church he founded.

So there is not the slightest doubt that the formulas given us by the evangelists and Paul were those that were being used by the Christians as they celebrated the Eucharist. The Gospels faithfully hand on what Jesus Christ, while still living among men, really did and taught for their eternal salvation until the day he was taken up to heaven. Could anything at all be more important than what he did and said about his body and blood? Our Lord's last meal was a Paschal feast, or at least a meal in the atmosphere of a Paschal feast, as he said. We know from Jewish writers how this can easily be fitted in to the full Jewish rite. The ancient commemorative meal of the Hebrews in which they recalled how God had freed his people from Egypt, was now to give place to a commemoration and reenactment of a new and final reality issuing from the mind and will of the risen Christ.

In the eleventh century Berengarius fell into heresy by failing to realize this point. His motto was, "I wish to understand all things by reason." The Eucharist is one of those things which cannot be understood by reason. Human arguments can never explain Christ's Real Presence.

John Chrysostom is known as "the Doctor of the Eucharist." In 398 he became Patriarch of Constantinople. He wrote, "We must reverence God everywhere. We must not contradict him, when what he says seems contrary to our reason and intelligence. His words must be preferred to our reason and intelligence. This ought to be our behavior to the Eucharistic mysteries too. We must not confine our attention to what the senses can experience, but hold fast to his words. His word cannot deceive." Writing of the words of institution he said, "You may not doubt the truth of this; you must rather accept the Savior's words in faith; since he is truth, he does not tell lies." *(to be continued)*

MASS INTENTIONS FOR 2025

If you wish to request any Masses for the next calendar year, please pay careful attention to these guidelines, which are intended to promote the common good and to facilitate the very complicated work of scheduling the requests from many parishioners sometimes for the same date. The pastor is morally bound to see to it that all our parishioners have the same opportunity to have Masses offered for their loved ones and personal intentions, which is the reason for the directives explained below. Thank you for your cooperation in abiding by these norms.

- Beginning on Monday, November 4, Mass intentions will be accepted for 2025. No intentions will be accepted before that date (no exceptions).
- Please make sure only to use the envelopes which will be available in church beginning Sunday, November 3 in order to fill out your Mass requests (one envelope per Mass).
- In the first round of scheduling, there is a strict limit of 10 (ten) Mass intentions per household. If a greater number is submitted, all the requested intentions will be returned. After the new year, there will be an announcement in the bulletin if there are any remaining available spots for 2025.
- You may request specific dates, which will be accommodated to the extent possible, but no promise is made about dates.
- It is not possible to reserve multiple Sundays.
- A minimum stipend of \$10 is suggested per Mass.
- For the time being, it is not possible to request a Mass by phone or e-mail. No Mass will be scheduled until the written request and accompanying Mass offering are received in the office. These may be submitted in the collection basket, by mail, or by coming in person to the sacristy.
