ABOUT ST. JOSEPH SHRINE

A magnificent Victorian Gothic edifice completed in 1873 and noted as of national architectural significance, St. Joseph Shrine is a landmark center of Catholic Faith, culture, and community in Detroit's historic Eastern Market district. Since October 2016, the Canons of the Institute of Christ the King Sovereign Priest have served and led the local faithful by bringing daily Masses, regular devotions, liturgical instruction, and an active parish life. As a result, the parish community at St. Joseph Shrine continues to grow, enriching both young and old, individuals and families from all backgrounds and neighborhoods.

In July 2013, St. Joseph was merged with two nearby parishes. Then in October 2016, St. Joseph became its own parish under the spiritual and pastoral care of the Institute of Christ the King. **In March 2020, the Parish was granted the designation of Archdiocesan Shrine** in recognition of its vibrant spiritual growth and daily life.

ABOUT THE INSTITUTE - SAINT THOMAS AQUINAS

Saint Thomas Aquinas was born on in 1225 in the castle of Roccasecca, in Aquino in Italy. His family wished for him to become a Benedictine at Monte Cassino where his uncle was Abbot. He began his education there at the age of five, started philosophy at the University of Naples at the age of fourteen where he was introduced to the Dominicans, a newly established mendicant order. At the age of nineteen he resolved to join them, a decision that his family opposed violently. After a few months, seeing that his resolve had not weakened, his family let him go and St. Thomas began his novitiate with the Dominicans.

It was in Paris that St. Thomas met his teacher, Saint Albert the Great and he followed him to the *studium generale* of the Dominican order in Cologne in 1248. Eventually, St. Thomas finished his studies and in 1252 was sent to Paris for his Master's where he wrote numerous works including the *Summa Contra Gentiles*. From Paris he went to Naples in 1260 and continued to teach and write. It was in this period that he composed the Mass for Corpus Christi as we know it today.

In 1265, St. Thomas was sent to Rome to set up a *studium conventuale* at the Dominican convent of Santa Sabina, for more advanced courses in philosophy and theology. This is where he began his most famous work: the *Summa Theologiae* which is meant for beginners in theology(!). In 1268, he was sent to teach again in Paris where he dealt with some troubling philosophical interpretations making their way through the universities. His work done, in 1272, he went to Naples where established a *studium generale*, and continued to write. It was here in 1273, that St. Thomas had two mystical experiences after which he concluded that all that he had written was like straw. He could no longer work and took ill. In 1274, while travelling to the 2nd Council of Lyon, he died on March 7th. He is a Patron of the Institute of Christ the King.

When St. Thomas was imprisoned by his family to keep him from joining the Dominicans, he was tested severely on the virtue of purity, from which he emerged victorious. It is clear to all that the Church's greatest theologian was known for his exceptional purity. Pope Pius XI even said about him: "If Saint Thomas had not been victorious when his chastity was in peril, it is very probable that the Church would never have had her Angelic Doctor." This is why he could exercise such supernatural contemplation and clarity of judgment in matters of the Faith.
