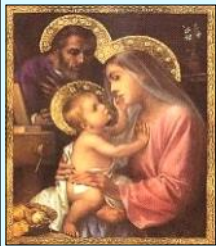

**Saint Charles Borromeo Administering the Blessed Sacrament to the Plague Victims by Sigismondo Caula
*St. Charles Borromeo, pray for us!***

Part 2 (Continuation from Last Sunday)

Seeing the distress and suffering of many of his flock stricken with the plague, St. Charles Borromeo, animated with zeal for their spiritual health, spoke these moving words to priests of religious orders seeking their assent to minister the Sacraments to the sick.

The Life of St. Charles Borromeo by John Peter Guissano, Bk. IV, Ch. VI - "Spiritual Care of His Flock During the Plague"

"Dear Fathers, ... **But this we say, that if it should please Almighty God that any of us should catch infection and die, that it would be a glorious end, rather deserving the name of life, for dying thus in the service of God and of our neighbours, it is most certain that we should attain to eternal life - that life which the saints and martyrs have made the end and aim of their labours on earth...** Moreover, it is an opportunity of ...offering up our lives in His service and in that of His plague-stricken brethren, even as He laid down His life for us on the cross, nay, even as He gives it to us His priests every day in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Who is there among you whose heart is so cold as not to respond to the call of our dear Lord, to whom we are so bound? **Who can refrain from offering himself, his health and life, and all that he has in sacrifice to Him?** (go to pg. 3)

On our part, it is only necessary to remain faithful to our resolution to reach the perfection of holy love by doing all we can to make it perfect. If we do not do that we are not aiming very high.

Shall we suffer ourselves to be overcome by the fear of death? In any case we must die ere long. What security have we, again, that if we abandon our duty in keeping out of reach of pestilence, that the judgment of God will not overtake us, and thus punish our inordinate affection for our perishing bodies? Believe me, reverend fathers, it is an easy thing to fall victim to this common visitation. We have innumerable examples before us of those who have hedged themselves round with every possible precaution, but have nevertheless perished. **For it is a scourge sent by God for the chastisement of our sins, and who shall deliver us from the hand of His power when it is His will to search us out?**

Dear fathers, what shall I say more? Shall I reproach you with the example of laymen, physicians and nurses, who, for a little temporal gain, expose themselves to far greater danger in their attendance than is required of us - touching them, handling them, and waiting upon them in every way? **But I will go further, and say there are many of them who do this, not for fee or reward, but from pure love of God. ... And shall we do less, His priests, who are the recipients of His special favours, who make profession leading a spiritual and perfect life?** Think of these things, beloved brethren and fathers, and show not yourselves to be so weak and faint-hearted that laymen shall rise up in judgment and condemn you...

I call upon you one and all therefore to devote yourselves generously to this work worthy of your high calling, and to make your service a special oblation to Almighty God, who has vouchsafed to charge Himself with the reward of all you do for Him... If it should please God that any of you fall a prey to the disease, and there should be none to serve you, I will attend you myself and have every care for your souls... **I am firmly resolved that no weariness, no fatigue, no peril shall make me quail from fulfilling my pastoral office, or from doing everything in my power for the souls which God has committed to my keeping.**

From the Rector's Desk:

My Dear Faithful,

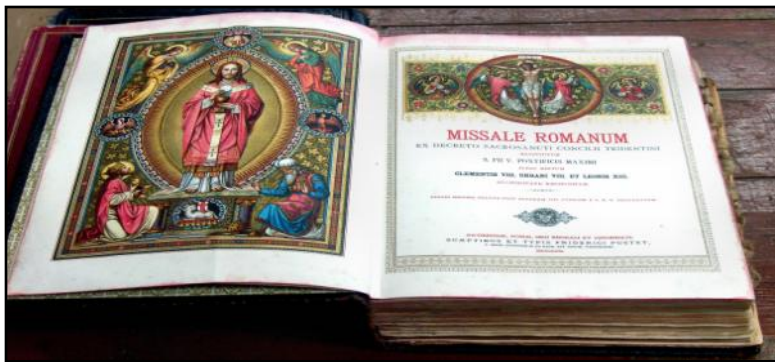
As we are blessed to be under the spiritual care of the Institute of Christ the King, we all have St. Francis de Sales as our patron in the school of holiness and perfection. We must aim at perfection as that is what God is calling us to be: the holiest version of ourselves. Spiritual perfection is impossible if we do not return to the source of grace in adoring Our Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament often throughout the day as our patron instructs: **"We must visit Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament a hundred thousand times a day."** As we are currently prohibited from receiving Holy Communion respectfully on the tongue, we can still maintain our desire for Jesus by: 1) Eucharistic Adoration and 2) by making frequent and pious Spiritual Communions to continue to nourish our soul. Just as a bee must return to the hive to receive instructions from the queen, so we who are seeking to make the spiritual honey of perfection must return to Our Lord to receive instructions from Him. *"I often speak with my Teacher, Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, because I can learn from Him. Jesus is the Teacher of the science of holiness. I go to Him because I would like to learn from Him how to become a saint. Of what use to me is all knowledge and education, if I do not become holy?"* said St. Francis de Sales.

This past week we celebrated the feast of St. Mary Magdalen, whom Our Lord recommends to us for her interior life of prayer as she "chose the better part." **I thus encourage you, if you are able under the conditions of this lockdown, to "choose the better part" and give Our Lord one hour of Eucharistic Adoration on Sunday or during the week.** This time of prayer can help us acquire the virtue of humility like children, to entrust ourselves in greater confidence to Our Heavenly Father: *"Do not look forward in fear to the changes in life; rather, look to them with full hope that as they arise, God, whose very own you are, will lead you safely through all things, and when you cannot stand it, God will carry you in His arms,"* St. Francis writes. We are living in difficult times where simply doing the ordinary minimum will not cut it very long before our little flame is fizzled out by the cares, pomps, and worries of the world in a tempest of darkness. Pray for the Church, pray for our Bishop, pray for me, pray for your family, pray for a conversion of sinners, and pray for the sick!

"It is not those who commit the least faults who are the most holy, **but those who have the greatest courage, the greatest generosity, the greatest love, who make the boldest efforts to overcome themselves, and are not immediately apprehensive about tripping,**" encourages St. Francis. This current pandemic is a call of our merciful Father to us all to convert and draw closer to Him in faith, hope, and charity by prayer and good works. Giving of ourselves generously to our loving Father in adoration and prayer, may we all persevere in remaining in the bark of Holy Mother Church and arrive at the port of salvation to receive His eternal loving embrace.

Eighth Sunday after Pentecost

INTROIT: *Ps. 47: 10-11, 2* We have received Thy mercy, O God, in the midst of Thy temple; according to Thy name, O God, so also is Thy praise unto the ends of the earth: Thy right hand is full of justice. (Ps) Great is the Lord, and exceedingly to be praised, in the city of God, in his holy mountain. Glory be. We have received...

COLLECT: Graciously grant to us, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the spirit to think and do always such things as are rightful: that we, who cannot exist without Thee, may be enabled to live according to Thy will. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: *Rom. 8: 12-17* Brethren: we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh; for if you live according to the flesh, you shall die; but if by the Spirit you mortify the deeds of the flesh, you shall live. For whosoever are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. For you have not received the spirit of bondage again in fear, but you have received the spirit of adoption of sons, whereby we cry: Abba (Father). For the Spirit Himself giveth testimony to our spirit, that we are the sons of God; and if sons, heirs also; heirs indeed of God, and joint heirs with Christ.

GRADUAL: *Ps. 30: 3; 70: 1* Be Thou unto me a God, a protector, and a place of refuge, to save me. In Thee, O God, have I hoped: O Lord, let me never be confounded.

ALLELUIA: *Ps. 47: 2* Alleluia, alleluia. Great is the Lord, and exceedingly to be praised, in the city of our God, in His holy mountain. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: *Lk. 16: 1-9* At that time, Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: There was a certain

rich man who had a steward; and the same was accused unto him that he had wasted his goods; and he called him, and said to him: How is it that I hear this of thee? Give an account of thy stewardship, for now thou canst be steward no longer. And the steward said within himself: What shall I do, because my lord taketh away from me the stewardship? To dig I am not able; to beg I am ashamed. I know what I will do, that when I shall be removed from the stewardship, they may receive me into their houses. Therefore calling together every one of his lord's debtors, he said to the first: How much dost thou owe my lord? But he said: An hundred barrels of oil. And he said to him: Take thy bill, and sit down quickly, and write fifty. Then he said to another: And how much dost thou owe? Who said: An hundred quarters of wheat. He said to him: Take thy bill, and write eighty. And the lord commended the unjust steward, for as much as he had done wisely: for the children of this world are wiser in their generation than the children of light. And I say to you: Make unto you friends of the mammon of iniquity, that when you shall fail, they may receive you into everlasting dwellings.

OFFERTORY: *Ps. 17: 28, 32* Thou wilt save the humble people, O Lord, and wilt bring down the eyes of the proud; for who is God but Thou, O Lord?

SECRET: Accept, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the gifts of Thine own bounty, which we bring Thee: that these holy and sacred mysteries may by the working of the power of Thy grace, sanctify us in our conduct of this present life and bring us to everlasting joys.

COMMUNION: *Ps. 33: 9* Taste and see that the Lord is sweet: blessed is the man that hopeth in Him.

POSTCOMMUNION: May this heavenly mystery avail us, O Lord, for renewal of mind and body: that we may enjoy the fruits of that which we celebrate. Through our Lord.
